## The Prince Rupert School Board NIGHT SCHOOL PROGRAME

Night School classes will commence on Tuesday, the 14th of October, in the Booth Memorial High School Courses are designed to assist adults to develop skills, knowledge and new interests at a reasonable cost.

Courses will be offered Tuesday evenings, 7:30-9:30 p.m., unless otherwise stated, from October to March—20 sessions.

Registration will take place Tuesday, October 14th, beginning at 7:00 p.m. at the High School. Fees are \$10 per course, payable at the time of registration, and are not returnable unless course is discontinued. Fees for 10 week courses beginning January 6th, 1959 are \$5.

Classes are open to all persons 15 years of age or over who are not attending an elementary or secondary

The School Board reserves the right to discontinue any course for which the enrolment is fewer than fifteen

BASIC ELECTRICITY—Class designed to provide a basic knowledge of electrical theory for electrician apprentices, instrument mechanics and those desiring a sound introduction to the basic principles of applied electricity.

Mr. R. M. Paterson DRAFTING-GEOMETRIC LAYOUT—Geometric layout with general drafting information as applied to piping or sheet Mr. T. M. Carscadden metal work. ENGINEERING MATHEMATICS—Class aimed at providing practical mathematical and engineering assistance to those working toward stationary engineering tickets.

Bartlett BOOKKEEPING — Instruction will be given in modern methods of double entry bookkeeping, including the use of general classified and synoptic journals, ledgers, making trial balance, simple financial statements and how to close Mr. G. M. Barrow a ledger. SHORTHAND—Theory of Pitman Shorthand will be presented. A concentrated course will be presented so that students may acquire a useable skill in the 20 lesson course. All

class members must be prepared to do out-of-class work. Mrs. L. Holder TYPEWRITING—For those who wish either to learn to type or to increase present speed and efficiency. May be offered both Tuesday and Thursday evenings, if enrolment permits, to allow those preparing themselves for office work to take two courses at night school. For example: Shorthand on Tuesday evening and Typewriting on Thursday.

Miss E. Gurr GENERAL MATHEMATICS-Class work which will be arranged to meet the needs of class members, may include arithmetic, algebra, geometry, logarithims and elementary Mrs. E. Walters trigonometry. ADVANCED HIGH SCHOOL ENGLISH-A general survey course in English Literature from the time of Chaucer, 1400, to present day authors. Classes will serve as a parallel and supplement to the Department of Education Correspondence course in English 91 for credit toward High

School Graduation Diploma. Miss I. Cumming ENGLISH FOR NEW CANADIANS-Classes designed for those who are unable to speak or to write English as well as for those who wish to improve their knowledge of speaking and writing. Emphasis will be on basic vocabulary and Language skills Tuesdays and Thursdays.


