FOOD IN ENTERTAINMENT

Pre-Planning Essential For Successful Party Menus

All party menus should be pre-planned say the home economists of the Consumer Section, Marketing Service, Canada Department of Agriculture in its series of tips for "Food in Entertaining," which begins today in the Daily News.

Offering good news to women with party planning food problems, the feature advises that hostesses choose simple dishes that they know how to make well and food that (1) suits their budgets, (2) suits the occasion and the season, (3) harmonizes in flavor, color and texture, (4) are filling and festive, attractively garnished and (5) can be almost completely prepared ahead of time so that they are free to be with their guests.

"Dinner Parties perhaps are not as common now as they used to be when every home had a dining room, but some hostesses still prefer to entertain their guests in this way. There are certain formalities of service that you will want to observe when you have a dinner party, but it is the food, of course which should receive most of your attention. Plan each course in relation to the others, balancing a rich dish by a simple one, so that the menu as a whole is interesting and satisfying.

Order of courses to follow are: Appetizer — sometimes served in the living room — example — tomato juice with canapes, celery and olives passed.

Soup — optional — usually a clear soup but if the main course is to be fairly light a cream soup is suitable.

Meat and vegetables — a roast is good with potatoes, one or

two vegetables and a suitable pickle.

Salad (optional) light, crisp and simple on individual plates. Example — lettuce wedge with a well-seasoned dressing.

Dessert — preferably something light, delicious and refreshing. Example, Bavarian Cream or Ice Cream and cookies."

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
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


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
