GOVERNMENT SURPRISED

The Canadian government protested to the U.S. then expressed surprise. Norman's name had been "dragged" into the hearings. The protest, delivered orally to the state department in Washington, was reported in Ottawa to be one of the strongest exchanged between the two governments in recent years.

Canada's external affairs department said Norman was cleared of Communist party suspicion at Cape Cod in 1939.

An Ottawa informant told The Canadian Press then that it had been established that Norman had never been at Cape Cod in his life.

He was fully cleared, the informant said, and his status as a trustworthy officer of the external affairs department was established.
