

VICTORIA (CP)—Highways minister P. A. Gaglardi Tuesday defended work done in 1955 on the Cassiar-Stewart road in northern B.C. The work was done by Wade and Wells limited of Trail.

Mr. Gaglardi has just finished an inspection of the road with Mines Minister Kenneth Kiernan, whose department is paying for the access road. The highways minister said Salvage critics of the work would have to "eat their words" if they went

over the northern road and saw its good condition. Mr. Gaglardi said it was his first trip over the road and although he didn't go over all the 67 miles completed by Wade and
