# Prince Rupert Must Have Band

WHILE the purpose behind Minday's Rememwith all sincerity, the fulfillment of the ceremony next spring, but into the hottest, angriest political left something to be desired. Many persons, in fact | fight this country has seen since 1926. a good many citizens who went to the cenotaph service to pray and pay homage to departed loved ones came away ill at heart. A ceremony as noble and dedicated as the Remembrance Day rites should go off without a hitch and nothing should be allowed to mar the sacred atmosphere attendant to it.

Apart from the things that went wrong, the timing, the forgotten wreaths, the verbal faux pas, the desperate lulls where there should have been none, the main objections voiced so far is the lack of an accompanying band for the national anthems and the hymn.


True, the militia pipe band was in the parade, in its rightful place with the local Royal Canadian Artillery battery, but its music was not sufficient to carry the whole parade nor suited to accompany hymns or anthems. The "Lament" was played by a piper in the appropriate spot in the ceremony. But when "O Canada", "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" and "God Save the Queen" went almost unsung except by a few brave persons with strong voices, then the service's continuity fell apart. A Remembrance Day service is one in which everybody takes part or there is little point to it.

Lack of a band was not the fault of the Legion. Efforts were made, without sucess, to bring in a Native Indian band. No, the point was Prince Rupert has no band. The Royal Canadian Navy reserve band had been disbanded as had the Booth Memorial High school band. The HMCS Chatham Navy band lost its instruments because of lack of interest. Even when the instruments were here so few turned out to use them or learn to use them that the RCN withdrew the costly instruments and shipped them to a reserve division where they would be put to good use.

The high school band folded when it lost a teacher who was interested in teaching youngsters to play and when new instruments were needed and couldn't be financed. Yet it is less than 18 months since Premier Bennett stood before a large growd at the annual New British ier Bennett stood before a large crowd at the annual music festival and told everyone that he personally would see to it that instruments for Booth Memorial High school band would be forthcoming. While he's about it the premier could confer with the education minister about supplying a full-time music teacher for the high school and ensuring that music is on the curriculum. Hitherto music work was done on the teacher's and students own time.

One thing is certain, the city needs a band and whether the City Council itself or some city organization decides to pick up the ball and carry it through to a goal, something is needed along a city band line before next November 11, if this important annual ceremony is to be the success and have the real meaning it should have. If the city isn't up to shouldering this responsibility then Premier Bennett should be reminded of his promise.






