

Captain Fernie Flaman, No. 1 Boston defenceman, came out of the game with a twisted ankle, a recurrence of an old injury. He hopes to be fit for Tuesday. Otherwise the team survived in good shape.

The Bruins hopped into a 2-0 lead in the first period on goals by Stasiuk and Leo Boivin. The goal was the second of the series for Boivin, defenceman who scored only twice during 55 games in the regular season.
