

## DIEFENBAKER LAUDED

## Duncan Kerr of Terrace Elected Conservative Candidate for Skeena

Duncan Kerr, secretary-treasurer of long-time Terrace firm Little, Haugland and Kerr Ltds, has been unanimously chosen as Progressive Conservative standard bearer for Skeena in the forthcoming federal election.

The decision was made Saturday night at a Conservative rally held in Terrace and attended by delegates from Smithers, Terrace, Kitimat, Telkwa, Hazelton and Prince Rupert.

Six members of the Prince Rupert Conservative association attended.

In electing a new slate of officers for the Skeena Progressive Conservative Association, the delegates named John Diefenbaker, honorary president, Deane Finlayson, honorary vice-president and Douglas Sutherland of Kitimat as president.

## Steelworkers To Negotiate For Kitimat, Kemano Workers

KITIMAT—Negotiations between the Aluminum Company of Canada, Limited and Local 5115, United Steelworkers of America, for a new collective agreement covering workers in Kitimat and at the powerhouse in Kemano open next week.

One of the demands that the union is making will be for a substantial increase in the present base rate of \$1.00.

This contract, the first to be negotiated between Local 5115 and the Aluminum Company, will replace an agreement signed by the former bargaining agent, The Allied Aluminum Workers Council. The Allied Aluminum Workers council was replaced by the Steelworkers after a representation vote of the employees was conducted by the Labor Relations Board last summer.

District director, Harry Sefton of the Steelworkers International staff is expected to arrive in Kitimat next week to assist the Union in various phases of negotiations.

## Bombay Co-Op Official Here To Study B.C. Ways

Fishermen's co-operative organization and marketing techniques will be studied for one week in Prince Rupert by Narayanrao Koli of Bombay, India, who arrived here today as part of a three-week tour of British Columbia's coast.

Mr. Koli, who is managing director of Bombay State Fishermen's Co-operative Association, will be assisted here by manager Kenneth F. Harding of Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-operative Association.

Mr. Harding made a similar visit last fall to India as part of the technical program formulated by the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations.

### 13 Canadians Die Violently

Ontario and Quebec had 12 of the 13 deaths reported in Canada over the weekend. Six died in each province with a total of five traffic fatalities in each. One man died in a fire in Ontario and in Quebec a youth was shot accidentally. Manitoba's one death in a fire completed the toll of 13.

## Gordon Scheduled To Hang Tonight

OTTAWA (CP)—Cabinet has commuted to life imprisonment death sentence imposed on James Carey but his companion in the fatal shooting of a Vancouver policeman, Joseph Gordon, will be hanged shortly after midnight tonight.

Both men were convicted and sentenced to be hanged March 19 for the shooting of Constable Gordon Sinclair. Evidence at the trial indicated that Gordon fired the fatal shot. Carey later claimed to be working as an undercover agent for the RCMP when he was present at the fatal shooting.

U.S. Halts Aid to Iran Over Deaths

TEHRAN (AP)—The United States today announced that the joint aid program in southeast Iran, where nomad bandits murdered three Americans, has been suspended until the killers are caught.

Clark S. Gregory, director of the program in Iran, announced the suspension after an investigation into the slaying of pretty Mrs. Anila Carroll, her husband and another U.S. aid official, and two Iranians.

Iranian troops and police on foot still pursued the ambushed killers over the mountain roads of the desolate, isolated section of southern Baluchistan.

BODY BROUGHT OUT

Meanwhile, the 35-year-old American woman's torn body was flown here. Street crowds watched silently as a flower-draped ambulance carried the remains from the airport to a morgue.

The U.S. aid official's wife was found Sunday two miles from the desert spot where her husband, Kevin, and his party were slain. She had been shot.

A U.S. embassy official said Iranian police were led to the body by local tribesmen assisting in the hunt for the slayers.

The discovery was made only a few hours after the interior ministry reported receiving a message from the notorious bandit chief, Dadshah, saying

Mrs. Carroll was "quite safe and unharmed" and offering to release her if the 60-year-old outlaw would be allowed to go free.

The government sent back an assurance of amnesty.

Policemen reported Dadshah probably would be captured soon.

They were so close to the fugitives that they had engaged them in a gun fight Saturday.

Police reports said Dadshah

was showing signs of awakening from their former lethargy.

"We must work hard for the election as this is a tremendous riding stretching from Sudbury to the east to Prince Rupert in the west," Mr. Harvey said.

Terrence delegate Frank Donck will assert that Conservatives are individualists and will not be led.

"It has been our downfall and should serve as a severe lesson. Canada is coming back to the two-party system but we must make haste and gather in those who have strayed into some of the smaller parties."

When Johnstone, then a constable, entered the bank in response to an alarm given by the bank manager, he was felled by a bullet from the revolver of one of the bandits. A second opened fire at him and Johnstone returned their fire from a prone position.

A third bandit ran from the back of the bank towards the front door and fired point-blank at Johnstone as he passed him. The officer's wound stopped him momentarily from continuing his fire and two of the bandits escaped from the bank.

Through suffering from his eight bullet wounds and buying all his ammunition, Johnstone followed them outside where they all collapsed on the pavement. One was dead and the other wounded. A third bandit walked out and surrounded Johnstone.

## 1,700,000 Now Idle In Britain

LONDON (Reuters)—Union leaders reported today that London district engineering workers have come out "perfectly solid" in the strike that now has left a total of 1,700,000 idle in Britain.

"There are well over 500,000 out" in the great London industrial belt, a spokesman said.

The London workers joined in the series of "snowball" strikes by the 40 unions which make up the giant Confederation of Shipbuilding and Engineering Unions. Already 170,000 factory workers—loosely called "engineers" here—are on strike to press their demand for a 10-per-cent wage increase.

By next weekend, strike leaders said there would be 2,000,000 workers out in the shipyards which began March 16.

Work has also halted in the nation's shipyards in a 17-day-old strike by 200,000 shipbuilding employees who are also demanding a 10-per-cent wage increase.

Direct talks between the confederation and the employers broke down Friday when the union chiefs rejected a three-per-cent wage offer.

## Mrs. G. E. Fisher Of Port Edward Dies Aged 50

Mrs. George Ernest (Lavinia Margaret) Fisher of Port Edward, died in Prince Rupert General Hospital Saturday at the age of 50.

Born in Tacoma, Wash., Mrs. Fisher came to Canada and Vancouver 34 years ago. She had been living in Port Edward since 1949.
