### Petition Sent To Republic By Witnesses

Jehovah's Witnesses of Prince Rupert Friday night approved a petition asking the Dominican Republic to lift its band of last July 25 restricting the religious activity of the movement there. Arthur Melin, presiding minister of the Prince Rupert Witresses said today the 'petition'

cited specific names and places of police brutality that were personally authenticated by eight of the ten American missionaries deported August 3 from the Dominican Republic. The missionaries related their experiences at a regional assembly in Baltimore, where the petition was originally adopted August 24 by 33,091 of Jehovah's Witnesses in attendance.

The petition was addressed to Generalissimo Trujillo, acknowledged dictator of the Caribbean

Reporting on the atrocities described in the petition, Mr. Meiin said, "In one sector whole families were taken to prison and the male members of the famil-, ies were beaten senseless before their own wives and children. Other male witnesses were kicked and hit with rifle butts until -villey were whleeding and fell exhausted. Some were beaten and left unconscious on the ground, in the patio of the prison with blood running out of their ears,

nose and mouth. "Christian people all over the world abhor such brutality as this," Mr. Melin said. "We befreedom-loving people should be informed of it."


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## NOTICE

- Registrations for the new Civic Voters List will be accepted during the months of August and September, at the City Clerk's Office, City Hall.
- Electors previously listed as Licenseholders, Householders and Spouses must re-register this year as cither resident-electors or tenant-electors.
- Corporations must submit written authorization naming some person to be its agent to vote on behalf of the corporation before Septmeber 30th, 1957.
- Registered owners of real property within the Municipality will be placed on the voters list as owner-electors if they are registered in the Land Registry Office as owners'as of September 30th, 1957. It will not be necessary for owner-electors to register.
- For the purposes of registration the following persons are qualified to have their names entered on the list of
- (a) As owner-electors, British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years who and corporations which are owners of real property within the municipality:
- (b) As resident- electors, British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years who are resident and have resided continuously for not less than six months within the municipality immediately prior to the submission of the declaration provided for in section. 31 and whose names are not entered on the list as owner-electors:
- (c) As tenant-electors, British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years who and corporations which are and have been continuously for not less than six mothhs immediately prior to the submission of the declaration provided for in section 33 tenants in occupation of real property within the municipality, and whose names or the names of which are not remered on the list as owner-electors or residentelectors.
