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MARKS 10th ANNIVERSARY

Dior Drops Skirts For Spring Styles

PARIS (AP) — Christian Dior yesterday celebrated his 10th anniversary as the leading Paris designer with another long new look.

Unveiling his "liberty line" collection of spring fashions, he dropped skirts by a good four inches—to more than mid-calf—and encased the feminine torso in a slim tube, hobble-tight below and with daintily low and wide necklines.

Many of the afternoon dresses came to the bottom of the calf and some almost to the ankle. Allowing for very high heels, Dior's new length seems to vary between 14 and perhaps eight inches from the floor.

However, Dior's new length is

not a fashion revolution of the proportions of his new look of just 10 years ago. He paved the way with a dozen long dresses last season — now he lets the ladies choose between longer and longest.

UNFITTED BACK

The model Dior calls "1957" typify his new line is a slinky tube, unfitted in back with an overskirt to the bottom of the calf, V-slit in front to show a mid-calf-length sheath beneath.

Dior's new colors are navy, sky-blue, white and off white, beige and red.

Bathing-suit décolletage leaves arms bare and shows a lot of shoulder and bosom. Otherwise sleeves are elbow length.

Suits have loose, low necklines filled in with draped chiffon scarves, blouses, or multiple-string beads. Coats are handsomely slender, buttoned to near the hem. Low cuff necklines are so popular they even appear on jackets and coats.

Small-brimmed hats are back. A new shape has a deep brim at the back, but is trimmed in front to show the face.

Belts are two or three inches wide, and usually of the same material as the jacket or dress.

A casual jacket or top is seen throughout the collection. It has the semi-fitted screw waist and just touches the hips. Quite a few skirts are pleated in big flat folds. Some have the coupé-in-hem so popular in other collections this season.
