## B.C. Tories Establish Party Unity

VANCOUVER (CP)—The British Columbia Progressive Conservative party, in a statement issued Wednesday, said unity has been established within the party.

The statement from the joint chairman of an organizational committee set up by the party—A.C. Desjardis and Leo Lader—says internal differences have been resolved.

Direction of party activities in the province between now and the election will be handled by the organizational committee of eight, created by the B.C. federal council and the provincial association and representing all sections of the membership.

Mr. Lader said "this is a great day for the conservative party, and for our new leader, John Diefenbaker, who called for just this kind of unity at the recent federal convention."

Nobody in the party," said Mr. Desjardis, "could, I think, fail to co-operate with a leader so completely and inspiringly dedicated to the cause of conservatism as John Diefenbaker."

George Hees, member of Parliament for Toronto-Broadview, now touring Canada on visits to provincial and local party organizations as personal representative of Mr. Diefenbaker, told leaders here Tuesday of election preparations in other parts of Canada.
