LOS ANGELES (AP) -The contract that could bring the Brooklyn Dodgers baseball club to Los Angeles lies today in a municipal pigeonhole.

Los Angeles city council adjourned one of the most hectic meetings of its career Monday night after nine hours of debate on the issue, leaving action on the contract hanging until next

But Mayor Norris, Poulson, looking forward 'to next week, declared confidently that the contract will be approved at its next reading. While the longest city council session in memory was still progressing, Poulson wired Dodgers President Walter O'Malley:

"At least 10 council members ... can be counted on without the slightest doubt to give full support to the ordinance at council session next Monday.

... On behalf of all the citizens of Los Angeles.. I welcome the Brooklyn Dodgers and you personally to this city." BOMB THREAT

On the council floor, meanwhile, a shouting, fist-pounding debate rolled on unabated even after council president John S. Gibson Jr. made this announcement:

"The police department says there is a bomb planted in the council chamber, and it is supposed to go off in less than half an hour."

Officers, acting on a tip from an anonymous caller, searched the chamber, but no council members and few spectators left. No bomb was found.

Councilman Patrick McGee, an opponent of the transfer deal, offered four amendments which he said would make the contract acceptable to him. All four were turned down by the council.


