Canada Wins Seat

Japan, Panama Also Elected

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)—Canada, Panama and Japan won election today to the United Nations Security Council on the first ballot after Czechoslovakia's Sovietsupported bid for a seat was resoundingly defeat-

Canada received 72 of the General Assembly's votes in the secret ballot. Panama had 74 and Japan 55. A two-thirds majority was

necessary for election. Czechoslovakia mustered only

Seventy-eight of the 82 members of the General Assembly cast ballots.

U.S. SUPPORTS JAPAN Because the U.S. was supporting Japan—a new UN member for a council seat, most of the Soviet-bloc opposition was regarded as being aimed against "WALK OR TAKE BUS" the former enemy state. But last week Russia's Deputy Forelgn Minister Vasily Kuznetsov made some pointed remarks about the validity of Commonwealth representation on the council on a geographical basis.
