LEAMINGTON, Ont.—Undesiring the fertility of the Canadian populace is proving costly to officials of the makers of Heinz Baby Foods. Toward the end of 1956 they announced a prize of \$57—the traditional Heinz number—every month for a year to the first Canadian child born in the Dominion in 1957.

The basis of selection was to be a scrutiny of birth announcements in Canadian daily newspapers. Instead of the anticipated "first baby," Heinz officials found themselves with four tiny candidates—all born on the last stroke of the midnight clock—three in Montreal and one in Hull.

Already obligated to "pay off" on these four babies, red-faced Heinz officials declared the baby derby closed.
