Crowd of More Than 700 Applauds Top Notch Concert by Army Band

Prince Rupert music lovers have a good memory.

As in January last year, a capacity crowd of more than 700 jammed the Civic Centre auditorium last night to hear—and see—the Royal Canadian Engineers band present a colorful and varied program.

From Rimsky-Korsakov to rock 'n' roll, from Negro spirituals to Strauss waltzes the audience was given proof that a good artist can make almost any kind of music enjoyable.

The bright red uniforms and shining instruments, along with practical gags, captured the eye as much as the music captured the ear.

The 36-piece band, with Captain Albert Brown Director of Music, has recently completed a tour of Eastern Canada. Tomorrow's concert will be the last of a two-week tour, which started at Williams Lake.

Most of the music played was familiar to all.

It included the Spanish dance "Fandango", a selection from "My Fair Lady" and "Yankee Doodle". Band Staff Sergeant Thomas Harden played a xylo-

phone solo and was then joined by two other band members for "The Typewriter", an arrangement played on a piece of wood ratchet and a bell.

The 17-piece dance band section conducted by Band Sergeant Major Ronald Milne, presented the most popular part of the evening's entertainment. The items were arranged by BSM Milne, who has spent several years arranging for Mantovani, Geraldo and others. Two trios by the rhythm section brought whistles and cheers from the audience.

The program was introduced by BSM Milne and Lieutenant Roy Forbes kept the audience amused during the interval. His announcement that the engineers hoped to make their tour a yearly event was applauded enthusiastically, and Lt. Forbes has since announced that they may return in October.

There will be another opportunity to hear the band play a program of light popular music in the Civic Centre at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon. The band will also play for a formal military ball tonight at the Armories.



Borscht Can Now Be Made With Packet of Soup Mix

Borscht is a delicious soup made from beets. Although of Russian origin, it has become quite a familiar sight on American menus. Served with a scoop of sour cream floating on top, borscht begins a meal with a continental flair.

This is an easy adaptation of the traditional borscht recipe. It begins with the very versatile juice.

1 cup fresh or canned lemon juice
1 can (16 ozs.) beets, drained
Stir onion soup mix, bay leaf, thyme, parsley, salt, pepper, brown sugar and lemon juice into boiling water. Bring to a boil, cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Strain. Stir in beet juice and beets, cut in small dice or thin julienne pieces. Serve hot or chilled. Garnish each serving with spoonful of sour cream. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

When it has simmered for a half hour, the soup is strained and the beets and juice are added at the last. This soup is delicious served either hot or cold.

For something different but in keeping with the nationality of borscht, make some piroshki to go with it. These are little packets of pastry filled with a meat mixture. Or a plate of cottage cheese with caraway seed mixed in and spooned onto black bread also makes a delicious accompaniment.

BORSCHT (serve hot or cold)
1 package onion soup mix
3 cups boiling water
1 bay leaf
1/4 teaspoon thyme
Sprig of parsley
1/4 teaspoon salt
Pepper
1 1/2 tablespoons brown sugar

"DELINQUENT CHILDREN OR DELINQUENT FATHERS"

May I suggest there is no better way of honoring your father than by accompanying him to church tomorrow. Why? Because at church we worship a God who is our heavenly Father. Jesus paid all earthly fathers the supreme tribute when He taught us to pray, "Our Father, who art in heaven." Sometimes one wonders if we fathers are worthy of this highest of all honors.

Nowadays we hear much about juvenile delinquency and hoodlumism. Various remedies are being suggested, but none of them has proved very effective.

May I suggest that much of our trouble is not juvenile delinquency, but fatherly delinquency. How can we expect our children to believe in a God who is like a father, unless we display some Godlike qualities in our own lives, such as truthfulness, honesty, sobriety, loving concern, and faithfulness?

I think one of the main reasons why young people become delinquents or hoodlums is because they have not seen these qualities displayed in their fathers. Instead, all too often, they have seen lying, dishonesty, drunkenness, indifference and infidelity.

How shall we fathers be worthy of the honor paid us tomorrow? How about attending church tomorrow with your family? Are you one of those fathers who leaves religion to the "wife and the kids"? Are you having a problem of discipline with your children? Unless we fathers are willing to accept the discipline of regular worship, how can we expect our children to believe in the God we profess to serve? How can we expect them to attend Sunday school and church if we don't go ourselves? If it is good for the "wife and the kids", why isn't it good for us too?

These are a few questions each father might ask himself on Father's Day. The ultimate basis of our Christian democratic so-
