# World news briefs

MOSCOW (CP)— Russia today announced she will test no more nuclear weapons, declaring an immediate suspension regardless of Western plans for further tests.

The announcement was made to a joint session of the Soviet parliament, the Supreme Soviet by Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko.

> PARIS 42-The Western Big Three today sent a note to Russia agreeing to a summit conference if diplomatic negotiations plus a foreign ministers meeting come first, diplomats here said.

The new note was unanimously approved by all 15 nations of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

WASHINGTON IN-Rrepresen-Wash.) said Friday the state department is soliciting congressional reaction to a Canadian proposal that the limit of national territorial waters be fixed at 12 miles.

Pelly said U.S. fishermen in the 1955 caught 20,000 tons of fish worth \$4,000,000 off the Canadian coast outside the threemile limit. Of this catch, he said, 15,000 tons were taken inside the proposed 12 mile limit.

plier of oil to the midwest bormer states as well as Washington and Oregon in the Pacific northwest.


