

Answer Hoped for Soon

T is more than 18 months now since grave charges were made against the provincial forestry administration and no answer has yet been given to the accusations. However, with the Supreme Court of Canada having cleared the way for a trial of Mr. Robert Sommer's libel suit and slander suit against Mr. David Sturdy his accuser, the chance of an answer appears likely.

After months of legal postponements while the case was appealed the Supreme Court has established the right of Mr. Sturdy, the defendant, to examine Mr. Sommers' bank account.

It would appear, therefore, that no legal barrier stands in the way of the Sommers-Sturdy suit. The courts of British Columbia, however, will be in recess until September. Then it is to be hoped the trial. will proceed.

Mr. Sommers, when he resigned from the government, stood alone, undefended by his Social Credit cohorts or his leader, Premier W. A. C. Bennett. He declared his natural wish to clear up all reflections on his administration of the lands and forests department. He said in the legislature at that time the intended to devote all his time and energy to this task. It is quite understandable that he should wish to do so and he must have been impatient and annoyed at the countless delays in legal procedure.

At the same time he could have been no more impatient or irked than the people of British Columbia whose business this is. There is much more than the feelings of Mr. Sommers and Mr. Sturdy involved in this case.

Therefore the earliest possible settlement of a serious situation is to be desired. The Legislature undoubtedly will want to know the answer before it meets again. So, we presume will Premier Bennett and his government. Most of all, the people of British Columbia want to know the answer.

Home Buying Rules Helpful

THERE is more to buying a house than scraping together enough money for the down payment, declares J. S. Stevenson of Winnipeg, president of the Canadian Association of Real Estate Boards.

First, he says, there are various types of ownership, of which single ownership and joint tenacy are the most common. There are the provisions of the agreement of sale to be considered, necessity for having the title searched, possible need for a survey, mortgage financing arrangements to be made, and requirements established for closing the deal.

"The best way to avoid pitfalls that might entrap an uninformed and uninstructed home buyer," Mr. Stevenson points out, "is for him to deal through a broker member of the local real estate board."

All real estate contracts must be in writing and P.M. Jails under seal. When a seal is not used, consideration in the form of money or services must be substituted instead.

The standard form of agreement and purchase used by broker-members of accredited local real estate hoards meets all normal needs. It sets out the parties clearly, contains an adequate description of the property, lists the purchase price and terms of payment, the date of posession and any mortgage

Final step in buying a house is adjustment of taxes, mortgage payments, insurance premiums and registration of documents. The buyer hands over his money and then, thanks to the helpful service of a trained and experienced real estate broker, he is ready to take possession of his new home.






