FOOD INDEX BOOSTS PRICES EVERYWHERE BUT IN VANCOUVER

OTTAWA @...Increases in food index across Canada pushed consumer price indexes up in all but one city-Vancouverat the beginning of March, the bureau of statistics said today. The index, based on 1949 prices equalling 100, remained unchanged at 124.5 in Vancouver.

Sharp Increases in egg prices were recorded in eastern cities, while a number of fresh fruits and vegetables---particularly polatoes and oranges-were higher in all regions. Prices of beef and pork increased in all regions while do-

clines generally were limited to margarine, coffee, sugar and fresh tomatoes. The March indexes, with figures for the provious month

in brackets, were: Winnipeg, 122.4 (123.0); Suskatoon-Regina, 121.1 (120.5); Edmonton-Calgary, 120.4 (120.2); Vancouver 124.5 (124.5).
