FRENCH DISPUTE SAID REASON FOR DISAPPEARING ALGERIANS

PARIS (Reuters)—Eleven of France's leading professional soccer players—all of them Algerians—were reported Monday night to have disappeared.

As police tried to trace them, a report from Tunis said two had been seen there.

Fears swept the sporting world that the Algerian insurgent movement waging guerrilla warefare against France was putting into operation a plan to "spirit away" the footballers. all of whom belong to first division teams.

But teammates said several of them had expressed opinions on the Franc-Algerian issue which might indicate their disappearance was voluntary.






