

"Suffer Little Children"

AST Friday The Daily News published two pictures of school children starting their first year at a city school. They were general pictures, taken with no thought of propaganda or ulterior motive to prove a point. Just a group of first-year youngsters at their desks. It so happened that they weren't all so called white children but in Prince Rupert this doesn't make any difference. Other papers in Canada made a point to choose white and colored children in their first-day-of-school pictures to show that in Canada we have no racial problem such has stirred the southern United States like no issue since the Civil War. Right now the southern states are doing practically the same thing as the South did in Lincoln's day. They are challenging the right of the U.S. federal government and at the same time threatening to undermine the progress made since the days when the Negro slaves were first freed.

The South was willing to go to war over the slavery issue and apparently Arkansas Governor Orval Faubus is equally willing to be arrested and charged with flaunting the law of the United States. In doing so, and using the state National Guard to back his contention of "maintaining peace and order" the governor is demonstrating to the people of Arkansas, his belief that the state law is bigger than that of the națion. It is an example that has already been set in the south. More and more southerners, fired by the white supremacy groups, are becoming willing to flaunt the federal law safe in the knowledge that a precedent has been set by the state. To Canadians such action is abhorrent, not only from the point of view of law and order but from the angle of how members of a so-called Christian society can, en masse, hold such views. It is bad enough when the militia is ordered out to prevent 'colored children from entering school. But when students themselves, not all, but a group, obviously indoctrinated by antiintegration parents, join together to rebuff Negro students then something is wrong with the thinking in the southern states.

We know that we are far removed from the areas sp, densely populated with colored people, that Americans tell us that we have no idea of "what it is like" and that our own Canadian laws regarding Native people are not perfect, but it seems that the time has come that the United States federal authorities and state officials should call a truce and start from scratch.

The state governors, judicial authorities and law-makers should confer with those from Washington in an effort to bring integration about. Christ said "Suffer little children to come unto me and forbid them not." He did not say only white children, only Hebrew children. Unless the United States does something definite to settle its racial problems, remove the manifestations of outright hatred and viciousness, then its slogan "The Land of Free" is sheer mockery. It is false to the extent that the Soviet Union makes excellent propaganda out of the racial incidents every time they occur. The incidents are told and retold around the world in places where the U.S. is trying to sell its "American way of life" against Communist pressure.

At the same time, Canadians should be on guard at all times to make sure that so far as discrimination or ill treatment of colored people or new Canadians are concerned, the finger can never be pointed at us.


