It touches everyone of us—in the pocket, yet comparatively few citizens take the trouble to go into the matter of public income and outgo.

There are more headaches than enough in these, days. It is the same with the monies contributed to welfare and other societies. The public is content to know that the work goes on from day to day, and is even willing to contribute to the required funds, but seldom wishes to take the trouble to find out if their. money is being well expended, or wasted.

There is an organization that is well known that is to say, its works are—to the public, and whose dedicated task it is to make worth out of waste, especially where human lives are concerned.

This is The Salvation Army whose services are placed at the disposal of all citizens, particularly those in unfortunate circumstances and those who are a liability to the community. It stands to reason that when such a person is restored to good citizenship, the red item in the ledger is transferred to the other and better side. In other words, a double saving is made.

The "Army" does a lot of this kind of work. It is doubtful if there is in existence today a more economical or more efficient welfare group than The Salvation Army. It is sometimes asked if the "Army" publishes an annual balance sheet. Of course it does, and this is made available and should be studied by those who are interested.

However, the story of service is not to be found entirely in figures. It is to be found in the daily actions of the uniformed men and women who are not ashamed of the source of their power and who believe in practical Christianity.

The "Army" places its accent on action—action motified by the love of God and love to man. This will be something to remember when the Prince Rupert Salvation Army Corps stages its one-night drive for \$5,000 on September 16.

Teachers Must Be Backed

HE declining standard of discipline in Canadian schools—and it is pointless to deny that such is the case—has moved a Quebec jurist to some sensible observations.

Judge Aimee Chasse, acquitting a teacher of a charge of unjustifiable corporal punishment of a pupil, said that moderate and seasonable steps to preserve discipline are within the teacher's authority.

The accused teacher, according to evidence, had grasped a boy by the hair and forced him to his knees. The judge upheld this as a "moderate and Heasonable step" and remarked that because of a general lack of discipline among children today it was improper to undermine the teachers' authority.

The authority teachers once held should be restored, if necessary by legislative action. When the occasion demands, teachers must be in a position to inflict humiliation on brazen trouble-makers, who seek to enhance their own reputation among their fellows at the expense of order and discipline.

If a good hiding is the best way to do it, the Teacher must be free to administer it. If the best method is through the performance of menial tasks about the school, then the teacher must be able to order it done. Authority is indispensable to good education.




