TUNIS (AP) — Presi-| ' dent Habib Bourguiba said today that he would personally lead the Tunisian people in a guerrilla war if necessary to resist France's maintaining of troops on Tunisial soil.

The Tunisian president, in a radio address, warned French authorities that any armed effort to break out of their blockaded bases in Tunisia would be met by force. Bourguiba added, however




