Disciplinary Move Commendable T is cheering to note that the Richmond Teachers

association plans to do something concrete about discipline in the British Columbia schools. The southern branch of the B.C. Teachers Federation passed a resolution over the weekend recommending that teachers be allowed to dismiss persistently disobedient students. An amendment to the resolution, which is to be presented to the Easter convention of. the BCTF, will state that expelled students be referred to the appropriate juvenile authorities for rehabilitation.

In a day and age when classroom space is at a premium and teachers qualified and unqualified have their hands full with over-large classes, the time to remove the "bench-warmers" is at hand. In fact it is overdue. There are too many students earnestly seeking an education to help them make a sucess of their lives, to have their studies and instructed disrupted by those who neither respect other people's feelings nor care whether or not they obey the regulations of the school. There is no reason for a teacher to have to haggle or argue with a student to maintain discipline. Nor is there any reason why other pupils' classes should be disturbed by those whose presence in school is a waste of time both to the staff and themselves. Should the teacher-shortage problem become even more acute, and there is every indication that it will, then a general weeding out of those who do not deserve to be in school should be instituted. There is little point in taking up time trying to educate those who do not wish to receive the education provided for them.

However, there are other sides to the question. On the one hand the student may not entirely be at fault. The fault may lie with the parents who brought the child up with no proper sense of discipline. The child might have grown up with little respect for his parents and less for anyone else, let alone a teacher. These are the ones, who along with their parents, need rehabilitating. Then again there are teachers who either cannot maintain or administer discipline or do not know how to command it. Both situations can lead to chaos.

It is commendable also that the Richmond convention supported a federation resolution that a province-wide survey be made to formulate a general policy for the guidance of teachers on how to maintain good discipline based on the qualities of firmness and kindness.

The sooner a start is made on improving the discipline throughout B.C. schools the quicker the students who want to learn will be able to do so. With the rabble-rousing, disobedient types out of the schools, the more a teacher will be able to concentrate on those pupils who have the desire, character and ability to become the good citizens the province wants.




