Few Hours Of Work At Kitimat

KITIMAT, B.C. (CP)— Work was resumed for a few hours Friday at a new residential area here, 24 hours after construction in the Kitimat area came to a standstill with a strike of 400 carpenters.

A group of 50 laborers, teamsters and engineers employed by companies not affected by the strike were allowed through the picket line at the Whitesail site when they reported for work in the morning. But they did not return after the noon-hour


