MAIL TIMES TO BE CHANGED MONDAY ON RETURN TO PST

Saturday at midnight Prince Rupert residents are reminded that they will regain their one hour of sleep lost on Saturday midnight April 27, when they turn back their clocks one hour.

With the change of time from Pacific Daylight to Standard time Saturday midnight, train mail service will also be offeeted, Postmuster R. S. Scherk announced today. Effective Monday, September 30, mail for train disputch

will close at the Post Office at 5 p.m. Mail for registration must be hunded in at the wicket one-half hour earlier. To be assured of mail being forwarded on the day of posting, Mr. Schork advised mallers of large quantities of mail to post it early in the day instead of waiting until the

Mail for air mail despatch will close at 8.10 a.m. Standard time instead of the same hour Pacific daylight time. No change is to be made at present in the time of street letter box collection, Mr. Scherk suid.
