# Maritime Storm Toll Cimbing Children Among Five Fatalities

HALIFAX (CP)—Danger spots still loomed in Nova Scotia today as the death, and damage toll mounted in the aftermath of the Maritimes' worst storm of the season.

Five are dead, including two children.

Crucial spot teday was at Bridgewater, N.S., where a highway bridge, weakened Sunday when an upstream dam broke, threatens to collapse into the channel directly in the path of the town's power plant.
