> VICTORIA (D)—Salary increases for nurses at Ladysmith, Nanaimo and Duncan hospitals have been recommended by the majority report of a conciliation board.

The recommended scale ranges from \$237.50 per month for first year general staff nurses who are not registered in British Columbia, to \$345 for fifth year supervisors.

Basic recommended wage for first year registered nurses is \$252.50. The report also recommended that registered nurses employed in a supervisory capacity who have passed an accredited one-year university course in nursing should receive \$25 monthly on top of their regular

The temporary employment rate was fixed at \$13. The board recommended that the contract be made retroactive to Jan. and that it run for two years.
