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TEE-EASE — An unexpected hazard which might be expected to add quite a few strokes to the score of even the most expert golfer is this trio of beauties relaxing on the Desert Inn Country Club course in Las Vegas, Nevada.

The vociferous complaints of the penalized and the sound of sticks whacking across delicate bodies will resound throughout the Civic Centre when floor hockey gets its inaugural introduction to the city next week. Junior teams start practices Tuesday at 7 p.m. and the seniors follow on Thursday at 7:30 p.m. Regular play is expected to start in about two weeks time. Players can pick up their hockey sticks at the Sports Shop, where there is a small supply on hand.
