COLUMBUS, Ga. (4) - Pete Rademacher Olympic heavyweight champion, will go on a European boxing tour early next year with four other Olympic fighters, an associate announced Thursday,

Mike Jennings, president of Unlimited Enterprises, listed the others as Jim Boyd, Olympic lightweight champion; Harvey Smith, featherweight; Joe Shaw, welterweight; and Jose Larres, middleweight,

Jennings said the tour would put Rademacher in condition for another title shot against champion Floyd Patterson, possibly next summer. Patterson knocked out Rademacher in the seventh round last August in Souttle - Rademacher's only professional fight.

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
