ITCICIL Flu Wave Asiatic Epidemic Over

-Asserts MHO There now appears little doubt that the recent

influenza epidemic which visited this area was of the Asian variety, Dr. W. B. Laing, Skeena Health Unit director, announced

today.

Dr. Laing reported that now the epidemic is over, it will not appear here again.

This being so, Asian influenza vaccine, which has only now become available for limited use, will not be distributed in this area by the Skeena Health Unit. However, the vaccine is available on the market, Dr. Laing

Dr. Laing reported that tests carried out on blood specimens from a male flu patient living at Port Edward, gave strong evidence that he was suffering from Asian' flu.

Findings of Asian flu may be confirmed by the isolation of type A Asian virus from the throat washings obtained from the patient being analyzed Ottawa, Dr. Laing said.
