Mantle's Homer Helps Yanks Thrash Senators

The 1957 baseball season has officially opened as far as Birdie Tebbetts, Bobby Bragan and Mickey Mantle are concerned.

Tebbetts finally saw his Cincinnati Redlegs post a victory after four straight defeats—a 10-6 triumph over St. Louis Cardinals.

Bragan, who speaks his mind with no thought of the consequences; finally succeeded in bringing about a feud between his Pittsburgh Pirates and New York Giants following his team's 3-1 loss at the Polo Grounds.

Bragan, a month ago, predicted the Giants would finish last.

Game-Saver
Mantle, after four homerless games, finally powdered his first four-bagger of the year as New York Yankees thrashed Washington Senators 15-6.

Other highlights spiced Monday's diamond activities on a

day usually set aside as a rest day for the athletes.

Milwaukee, the National League's only unbeaten team, made it five victories in a row with a 9-4 triumph over Chicago Cubs.

Clem Labine turned in his third game-saving relief chore as Brooklyn Dodgers whipped Philadelphia Phillies 5-1.

Kansas City, which hasn't been able to beat anybody else, gained its third straight success against Detroit, coming from behind to defeat Tigers 11-7.

Baltimore beat Tom Brewer for the first time in his career, knocking off Boston Red Sox 7-5.

Willie Mays hit his third home run in three days to account for all the Giant runs.

Triple Steal
Hank Bauer hit a grand slam homer in the Yankees' rout of Chuck Stobbs, an old Nemesis, while his mates rubbed it in by pulling off a triple steal.

Vinegar Bend Mizell, who seldom lasted through the first inning during the exhibition season, showed little improvement as the Reds clubbed him for four runs in the second inning and added four more of Lindy McDaniel in the third.

Johnny Temple and Ed Bailey cracked three hits each to pace the Redlegs' 14-hit assault on six St. Louis hurlers as the Cards chipped in with six errors.

Wally Moon, Ken Boyer and Walker Cooper homered for the losers.

Stan Musial continued his early spring hitting with four hits to boost his average to .524.

Encouragement
Ruben Gomez, encouraged by Mays' three-run homer in the third, turned back the Pirates with six hits.

After the game, Giant manager Bill Rigney denied a request by Bragan for his Pirates to hold a post-game batting session.

Rigney, still ranked by Bragan's crack that the Giants were the worst team in the National League, growled a terse "to hell with them," in turning down the request.

Bragan's comment "They need the practice worse than we do."

Consistent Dawson Creek Bowler Dominates National Championship

EDMONTON (CP)—Two newcomers to national bowling competition held the advantage in the singles today as the Canadian five-pin bowling championships moved into the second half with the Eastern titlists trailing in all except one event.

Only the Toronto East women's team was able to crack through the strong Western showing Monday night as the first five-game block of the 10-game tournament was completed.

The Toronto women scored 5,554 points to take a lead of 316 over the Western champions from Calgary.

TURNED TABLES
In the men's team competition, another Calgary crew turned the tables, taking a 308-point lead over the Eastern champions from Sarnia and London, Ont., who counted exactly the same as the Eastern women—5,554—and found themselves well off the pace.

In the singles, it was Elvera Laughy of Edmonton, who won the Western title in her first attempt, and Ralph Atkinson of Dawson Creek, B.C., making his first appearance in the Canadian meet, who set the pace.

Miss Laughy, a 26-year-old cashier at the bowling alleys where the competition is taking place, rolled up a five-game

score of 1,049 to take a 45-point lead over Mrs. Vera Ward of Hamilton, a youthful grandmother who was a finalist in 1955.

Atkinson, a Western winner in 1950, three years before the Canadian championships started, took a 79-point lead over 24-year-old Ron Williams of Guelph, Ont., when he came through with a fifth game 324 for a total of 1,315.

Williams, who averaged 252 in winning the Eastern title, had the high single score of the day with an opening game 375, but he fell back in following games and twice was under 200. Atkinson was fairly consistent and averaged 263.

Dot Poppin, a five-year major-league bowler, paced the Eastern women's team, averaging 247 a game.

Neal Roche was the big gun on the Calgary men's team, rolling games of 304 and 305 and averaging 287 over the five games.

Al Bannister came through with a 317 in the second game when the Calgaryans scored 1,313 points to go ahead to stay.

Allan Cup Final Tonight End of Cinderella Story

TORONTO (CP)—The Allan Cup, final opening at Maple Leaf Gardens tonight is probably as glamorous as any in the trophy's 54-year history.

To begin with, this year marks the first time that a United States team has been in the final battle for Canada's Senior A-hockey championship.

Spokane Flyers, kings of the Western International League, are making their debut in Allan Cup play and may become the first American team to have its name inscribed on the silver cup.

Sir H. Montague Allan presented to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association in 1903.

Their opponents, Whitty Dunlops are also in Allan Cup play for the first time and their position there climaxes hockey's 1957 "Cinderella" story.

INCREDIBLE
Dunlops met and conquered Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen, Allan Cup champions of two years ago. They went on to meet North Bay Trappers, champions of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association and again they were expected to come a cropper—again they won and—incidentally were in the Allan Cup final.
