

Sidewalk Repairs, Ditch Work Begun To Improve Section of Sixth Avenue

The sidewalk on Sixth Avenue East is being repaired and the ditch widened and deepened to conform to requirements for a proposed storm sewer it was reported to City Council last night by chairman of the Board of Works, Alderman Norman Bellis.

Ald. Bellis said that it was the opinion of the Board of Works that if the ditch was kept clear and the water running at all times, no hazard would be created as inferred by Ald. P. J. Lester at council's last meeting.

The report added that consideration was being given to replacing the sidewalk with a gravel-filled type of sidewalk in the near future.

Replying to a question from Ald. Kay Smith on whether it would be possible to place a temporary cover across the ditch, Mayor George E. Hills said that if the city fixed that one up then it would be duly bound to fix all like problems in other localities.

He said the city could not fix one portion of the town and not the other unless there was an obvious hazard involved, because of the huge expenditure.

Ald. Lester commented: "Every time we come across an item such as this Your Worship says there's a lot more places that are worse."

The damaged sewer main at Second Avenue West at the junction of Second Street running in an easterly direction will be renewed with a 12-inch concrete pipe for a distance of approximately 144 feet at an estimated cost of \$5,000.

Upon a motion of Ald. A. Donald Ritchie, council will write a letter to former chairman of the Parks board C. P. Balagno, who submitted his resignation Thursday, thanking him for the services he has rendered the city over the past ten years as a member of the Parks Board.

Request from the Library Board for \$2,000 to meet current expenditures until such time as the budget is completed, was pur- agreed upon.
