Renowned Violinist Here For Concert Next Week

An internationally famed violinist who has been playing to packed houses in many parts of the world will make her first appearance in Prince Rupert February 10, as the third artist in the Prince Rupert Concert Society's 1956-57 series.

Edmonton-born Betty Jean Hagen, still in her mid-20s, has received outstanding recognition as winner of the Leventritt prize in New York, the Carl Flesch Medal in London, the Pathé-Marconi prize in Paris and other notable awards.

In 1952 the Canadian-born artist was chosen "the most outstanding woman musician in the British Commonwealth."

Miss Hagen has no less than eight European tours to her credit and has appeared as soloist with numerous famous orchestras including the New York Philharmonic Symphony.

She began to study music as a child in Edmonton and at the age of nine was given a two-year scholarship at the Chicago Conservatory of Music. During the Second World War Miss Hagen continued her studies in Edmonton and Calgary.

In 1949, Miss Hagen entered the class of the eminent violinist Donald King Smith, a noted pianist who teaches at the Eastern Washington College of Education, will assist Miss Hagen for her concert here, with the celebrated concerto by Medelssohn as the central work.

Ever Since Eve

ONE OF GRANDMA'S COOKING SECRETS which has come back into its own in the last couple of years is the use of herbs. Anyone can work magic with them, and what a difference their gentle touch can make to a dish! But in order to get the most out of them, one must know how to use them. So the standard tips on using dried herbs must be followed for successful results:

- Buy only in small containers; a little dried herb goes a long way; also herbs lose flavor with time.
- Note date of purchase on label; then renew herb at least once a year, even if not used. Don't make antiques of herbs—once the scent is gone, they're worthless.
- If you aren't following a specific recipe, start with a little herb; taste to decide whether to add more.
- If it's a stew or soup you are making, add herb during the last hour of cooking.
- If the soup is canned or frozen, add the herb as you heat the soup.
- If it's a roast you're cooking, add herb toward end of roasting.
- If it's a steak or chops, sprinkle with herb during broiling. Or about one hour ahead, brush with salad oil, sprinkle with herbs; then refrigerate until needed.

• If it's meat loaf, hamburgers or stuffings, etc., add herb when mixing.

• If it's a vegetable or sauce, add herb while cooking.

• If it's a dish that calls for no cooking, such as vegetable or tomato juice, salad dressing, a dip, dunk or spread, let herb stand in it awhile.

THE FOLLOWING EIGHT are the basic herbs with some of their many uses:

BASIL—For crab meat, shrimp or tuna spread or dip. Vegetable soup, veal, pork, beef or lamb roasts or pot-roasts, fried or broiled chicken or liver, any stew, meat loaf or hamburgers. Any cheese, rice, or macaroni dish or Spanish omelet. Baked or broiled mackerel, bluefish or halibut.

DILL—Tomato soup or juice, any cheese spread or dip. Italian spaghetti; lamb steaks and chops. Any egg or cheese dish. Boiled, baked, broiled or fried fish and any shellfish dish.

MARJORAM—Onion or spinach soup; any cheese; fish, shellfish or liver spread. Chicken or

meat pie, any stew, roast or poultry dishes. Any cheese or egg dish.

OREGANO—Tomato soup or juice, pork, lamb, beef or veal. Chicken spaghetti sauce. Omelets or any shellfish dish.

ROSEMARY—Chicken or pea soup. Favorite stew, pot roast or chops. Meat loaf or kidneys, spaghetti sauce or any egg dish.

SAVORY—Pea, lentil or bean soup. Lamb roast, stew or chops. Pork chops or roast, chicken or turkey dishes. Egg dishes.

TARRAGON—Tomato or vegetable juice. Any soup or chowder. Chops or steaks, chicken, turkey or game. Beef or lamb stew or any veal dish. Any egg dish.

THYME—Fish or clam chowder. Lamb in any form; veal roast, pot roast, pork chops or roast, chicken fricassee or pie, scrambled eggs or Welsh rarebit.




