## UN Proving Success Where League Failed

Where the League of Nations failed and the United Nations is succeeding, both with same principles of "Liberty, Equality and Justice," is that countries in the Western World now believe and practice what they formerly believed but only talked, the Prince Rupert Canadian club was told last night at its dinner meeting in the Broadway cafe.

Dr. D. E. Chatwin, of Victoria, who has lived in most parts of Canada, as National Organizer of the United Nations association in Canada, gave his audience an insight into the operations of the UN in his address, "United Nations — Success or Failure."

The League of Nations, formed following the First World War, did not keep its promise to Germany regarding places to buy and sell raw material, he said. Hitler, who came into power during a depression, found Germany's request not heeded and took his country to war, Dr. Chatwin continued.

Dr. Chatwin said that the United Nations formed after the Second World War, saw England the first country to practice UN principles by giving her colonies freedom of government as they were ready for it.

In the early years the UN learned that it was not practical to preach democracy to people who were sick and hungry nor to countries where one out of three persons were living under communism. It was necessary to sell an idea, a most difficult job, he said.

"This problem of communicating with one and a half billion

people, who are illiterate and filled with prejudices and ruled by magic spirits was a tremendous challenge to the UN."

"To join together 14 enemy countries, surrounding the Mediterranean through destroying the locust, a problem common to all, was a really important job that the UN accomplished," Dr. Chatwin quoted.

Dr. Chatwin said that the incident of blindness around the Gold Coast of Africa, which effects one out of 18 persons by the time they become adults is just one of the current problems being tackled by UN.

Dr. Chatwin said that in political problems, the combined opinion of UN has effected good government policy.

"Have patience with the UN and more than just faith in the idea of UN and what it stands for," the speaker urged.

Regulations — Section 35 "Highway Act"  
Extraordinary Traffic  
Skeena West District

The undersigned, being a person authorized by the Minister of Highways, in writing, to exercise the powers vested in the said Minister in Part II of the "Highway Act" and being of the opinion that certain highways within the Skeena West District are liable to damage through extraordinary traffic thereon, hereby makes the following Regulation, pursuant to Section 35 of the "Highway Act", effective from 12:01 a.m. on the morning of April 24th, 1957, until further notice:

No person shall operate any vehicle over the Northern Transprovincial Highway No. 102 Terrace - Pacific, having a maximum gross weight (including weight of vehicle) in excess of 4 tons (8,000 lbs.).

Half-ton model trucks restricted to 50% authorized carrying capacity.

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
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
