

LIFE SUSPENSION OF LICENCE URGED FOR VANCOUVER DRIVER

VANCOUVER (P) — Life suspension of a 26-year-old man's driving licence was recommended in police court Tuesday by Magistrate Alexander McDonald.

He dismissed a charge of criminal negligence against Willi Mampel but recommended his licence be suspended for life "or until medical evidence can be produced showing he is capable of handling a motor vehicle."

Mampel testifed he "blacked out" just before an accident in which his car and a parked vehicle were demolished May 27. He said he was injured while a passenger in a car in Winnipeg in 1953 and had had a brain operation in 1954. He had suffered two blackouts between the time of the operation and the accident here, neither while he was driving.

Dr. Peter Lehmann, a specialist in neurological surgery, said it would happen again. In his opinion Mampel is not fit to drive.

Eddie Jones, Ken Harris and Tommy Smith, local fishermen, will swear to the truth of this fish story. The monsters. swimming placidly around the boats off Naden Harbor in the Queen Charlottes, seared the daylights out of the mon!

Here's how they described what they saw one day in June: One of the unknowns was grey and spotted. The other was completely dark and had a huntp in the centre. Both were about 35 feet long, had mouths like a "duck bill" and bodies

They also have a "breather" in the nose which shows
