o the new Parliament. "I will do my best to serve the 0 people that elected me," Howard I said, when the news of his vicl tory finally broke.

"That's what an MP is for . . 14 I'm only a figure in the game. 12 And I thank all those who believe in my party and chose me 13 as the party's representative."

Mr. Howard compiled a total 205 of 5,411 votes, Applewhaite drew 82 4,869 and Duncan Kerr of the 20 Progressive Conservatives had

The fight was even harder 24 than the figures indicate. At one time only one vote separated the two front runners.

Election Looms Vear

Parliament faced a stalemate in the Commons today, but a turnover of the government to the Progressive Conservatives appeared likely as the result of Monday's general election.

John Diesenbaker's Opposition party came up with the biggest block of seats but lacked a clear majority, and a new election within the year loomed as a distinct, possibility.

The 61-year-old Conservative leader would need the support of smaller House parties to carry on. How long this could last problematical. Social Credit Leader Low said his party would co-operate with whatever government is formed until "it becomes desirable to have an election to break the stalemate." CCF Leader Coldwell said his group will not merge with any party but will be guided by what legislation a minority govern-
