Hardballer Bill Sunberg Collects Impressive Win

Bill Sunberg, basketball player, boxer and baseball last night had his fling as a softball pitcher and brought home the bacon for Local 708 as the pulpworkers thumped Savoy Hotel 14-7 in a Prince Rupert Softball league game at Gyro Park.

Sunberg, who held Savoy hitless in six of the nine innings, error splattered game, didn't get too much help in the field from his team-mates who booted a total of 10 plays. However, he struck out 10 hotelmen and only weakened in the sixth and seventh innings when he gave up three safeties in each inning.

Meanwhile Local 708 batters treated the offerings of John Leniuk and Bill Yerema with little respect hammering out a total of 17 hits, aided and abetted by eight Hotel errors.

Local 708 had a little difficulty warming up on Savoy starter Leniuk, who in all fanned 12 pulpworkers and walked four of them. Bill Hardy, Local 708 utility man (left field, pitcher and last night right field) collected four hits in six trips to the plate and of them in a double in the union's big fifth inning, when pitchers Leniuk and reliever Yerema faced a total of 11 batters and gave up six hits.

Collecting two-baggers for 708 were Buddy Hatchford, Butch Currie, Sunberg, Kuruk, Hardy two more and Currie one more.

Griesel gave up 15 hits and walked none. Helland allowed one hit and walked two.

NBA GIVES MOORE ULTIMATUM

DETROIT (AP)—The National Boxing Association says Archie Moore must defend his light heavyweight crown in a United States bout by July 7 or relinquish the title.


The latest decree stems from Moore's failure to meet Tony Anthony of New York in a Detroit fight scheduled for Friday night.
