HOLLYWOOD (M)—Pat Hingle, now only 33, has been a soda jerk, gas station attendant, newspaper boy, farmhand, chauffeur, pants presser, fruit canner, factory worker, truck driver, shoe salesman, theatre usher and actor.

As an actor, he's doing okay these days. He had a long run in "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof" on Broadway, made a hit in the movie "The Strange One" and now is one of the stars in "No Down Payment" at 20th Century-Fox.

Pat's a good looking fellow with curly blonde hair and a friendly manner. I asked him how he managed to cover so many lines of work.

"It's easy to do when you go on your own at an early age," he said. "Because of family problems, I lived by myself from the time I was 14."

"It wasn't bad at all. I had a little room above a garage by myself, but the folks in the town were really friendly. I had a paper route, and for breakfast I'd trade the baker a paper for some doughnuts or rolls and the grocer another one for a pint of milk.

Pat earned his way through school and started at the University of Texas. He enlisted in the navy in 1942 and served through several major battles in the Pacific.

Returning to the university, he enrolled as an advertising major—"Since that seemed like a good way for a poor boy to get rich in a hurry." But he took up acting in some campus plays —

"that's where the pretty girls were."

The experience spoiled him for advertising, plus which he met one of the pretty girls in his first play and married her in 1947. They now have a four-year-old daughter.

The Hingles decided to try their luck in New York after graduation, but "I couldn't even get in to see the people who could turn me down."

After jobs as a file clerk and waiter, he went about job-seeking systematically, keeping a card file and calendar on all casting possibilities.

The system worked. He started getting roles in TV and little theatres. Then he auditioned for the Actors' Studio. He made the team, and that was the turning point in his career.

U.S. Tariffs Stand Said Lacking Wisdom

VANCOUVER, B.C. (C)—Tom Elliott, manager of the British Columbia and Yukon Chamber of Mines, says he can't understand the U.S. move to put higher tariffs on imports of lead and zinc.

"I fail to see the wisdom of their plan, because it is an established fact that the mineral resources of the U.S. are rapidly being depleted," he said Thursday in an interview.

The new U.S. plan, disclosed Tuesday, will wipe out present tariffs on imports of lead and zinc and replace them with a heavy excise tax, he said.

B.C. exports about \$42,000,000 worth of lead and zinc annually to the U.S., Mr. Elliott said, and the new plan will have "a particularly serious effect" on production of the two metals in B.C. and the Yukon if it becomes law.

"Obviously, that country the U.S. in years to come, will be forced to depend more and more on imports of metals from countries like Canada," Mr. Elliott said.

He said the U.S. already depends on Canada to some extent for nickel, iron ore and asbestos.

Blackwood on BRIDGE

Bidding Higher Ranking Suit Second
In Today's Hand is Known as Reverse

If Mr. Dale had responded with any other call than a heart raise, Mr. Masters had planned to bid spades on the second round. Bidding one suit and following with a bid in a higher ranking suit above the one level is known as a reverse.

Since this sequence may force partner to go the three level to show a simple preference for your first suit, it shows a strong hand. The question is "How strong?"

On no other subject of bidding is there more difference of opinion. Some players make a fetish of the reverse and will not use it unless they have 19 or 20 points in high cards alone.

Others are willing to reverse with only slightly more than a minimum hand, so that they can bid their longer suit first and avoid giving a distorted picture of their distribution. Thus one of the most important questions to put to a new partner is: "How strong are your reverses?"

I favor the middle view between the two extremes. When your two suits are both majors I recommend six playing tricks in opening bid values before you decide to reverse. Mr. Masters' hand today represents just about a minimum hand on which he would be justified in bidding hearts first and spades on the next round.

Mr. Abel led the queen of diamonds and it won when Mr. Masters played small from the board. On came the jack of diamonds, dummy played small and Mr. Masters ruffed. He laid down the ace of hearts and learned from Mr. Abel's club discard that he would probably have to lose two trump tricks.

However, he abandoned that idea in favor of another line of play. At trick four he led to dummy's ace of clubs. He returned the six of diamonds and ruffed it. Now he cashed the ace and king of spades, the king of clubs, and ruffed his last club.

With eight tricks in, he then led dummy's king of diamonds which was covered by the ace. All he had to do here was to ruff with the seven of hearts and cash the king of hearts to make his contract. But it was more fun to play it a different way.

Mrs. Keen had played ten cards and it was an absolute certainty that her last three were Q 10 9 in hearts. So, Mr. Masters simply discarded a spade on the last diamond trick and let Mrs. Keen win. She was end-played in the trump suit and her lead away from the queen automatically gave Mr. Masters tricks with the jack and king.






