Council Unable To Deal With Fines Driver Told

Request that City Council should reduce by half a speeding fine imposed in city police court was heard at Monday night's meeting.

Ronald J. Tubb, 233 Ninth Avenue East, was in the Council Chamber to hear his letter of protest against the \$50 fine imposed on him by a local magistrate.

He pointed out that a driver charged with the same offence at the same court on the day he was fined, was ordered to pay \$20. Since then he had noticed that fines imposed for speeding at Police Court had never exceeded \$25, and therefore requested that he be reimbursed to the amount of \$25 to bring his fine in line with those imposed on other offenders.

Acting Mayor Peter J. Lester said that the council was unable to deal with the matter and suggested that Mr. Tubb appeal to the County Court or to the Attorney General's department.



