

## Lifting of Curbs Urged To Ease Dentist Lack

The acute shortage of dentists in the province could be alleviated if some of the restrictions imposed by the B.C. Dental College on qualified immigrant practitioners were lifted, Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council were told last night.

Outlining some of the reasons why the serious shortage of dentists existed, particularly in Prince Rupert, P. J. Lester of the International Brotherhood of pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers, Local 708 claimed that the Dental College would not grant permits to immigrant dentists, even though it has been proved some are better qualified than Canadian dentists.

The college claimed that by allowing immigrant dentists to practice in the province it was lowering the standards, he explained.

Citing one exception, Mr. Lester said that a qualified Swiss doctor had been given a permit for a short period to operate in Smithers. He stated that when the permit had expired, terminating the dentist's stay, so vociferous were the protests of the
