TV Coverage of NHL Action May Expand For Next Season

DETROIT (AP)—U.S. network pessimistic about network television coverage of National Hockey League action is only two weeks old, but already there is considerable talk about expanding the programming next season.

The second in a series of 10 weekly telecasts of big league hockey came off in Detroit Saturday afternoon, and the number of stations (CBS) taking the play-by-play action increased sharply.

"When the first NHL telecast took place, the stations numbered 60. This time there were 100."

"Someone had to crack the ice," said Ken Mackey, publicist for the network's sports department. "A lot of stations wanted to let someone else try it first. Some of them watched it in the studio with prospective sponsors. Oddly enough, they were among the first stations to okay it."

Eddie Dorohoy Scores Four Goals, One Assist As Americans Down Canucks in Near Shut-out

Seattle Americans turned on the power that has kept them at the top of the Western Hockey League's Coast Division Saturday night. It was Eddie Dorohoy who pulled the switch.

Dorohoy scored four goals and got two assists to lead the Americans to an almost single-handed 7-1 victory over Vancouver Canucks. Only a goal with less than two minutes remaining saved the Canucks from being shut out.

The loss left them with only a one-game lead over the third-place New Westminster Royals, who were busy shutting out Victoria Cougars 3-0.

MOSIENKO SCORES THREE

In the Prairie Division, the Edmonton Flyers failed to add to their league lead as they went down 5-2 before the last-place Winnipeg Warriors. Veteran Bill Mosienko scored three goals.

Already the WHL's leading goaltender, Bev Bentley stopped 22 shots to earn his fifth shut-out of the season. At that, he was not as busy as Marcel Peltier who handled 39 in the Victoria net.

Of the 47 minutes of penalties handed out by referee Vern Buffey, 24 went to Victoria. The Cougars' total was enhanced by two majors and a misconduct by defenceman Nelson Bulloch. On the New Westminster side, a 10-minute team misconduct was handed out when Pete Ducham left the bench to join a frolic between teammate Arlo Goodwin and Bulloch.




