Urges Weapon Ban

Space Missile Control Asked

UNITEDNATIONS N.Y. (CP)—The United States submitted to the United Nations today a new five-year disarmament plan which would include a ban on further stockpiling of nuclear weapons. It also calls for international control of space missiles.

The program would go into effect, however, only after an iron-clad system of controls and inspections has been established to guard against violations of evasions.

The plan was outlined before the General Assembly's 80-nation political committee by chief U.S. delegate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., as that body opened its general debate on the disarmament problem.
