WHEN THE COMMISSION COMES WEST.

It cannot be too strongly realized by the boards of trade throughout the west that they have a duty to perform in arranging to have convincing proof furnished to the Railway Commission at every point it visists that there is a solidly united and determined west behind the demand for just railway rates. The points in the west at which the Commission will sit, and the dates, as set forth in an Ottawa despatch are as follows:

Fort William, Wednesday, July 17; Winnipeg, Thursday, July 18; Moose Jaw, Saturday, July 20; Regina, Monday, July Fisher, Raymond 22; Saskatoon, Tuesday, July 23; Edmonton, Wednesday, July McIntyre, Leo 4; Calgary, Thursday, July 25; Vancouver, Saturday, July 27; Victoria, Tuesday, July 30.

All that the west wants is a square deal; and that is what all the west wants.


