


Rupert Staves Off Ketchikan Rally To Take First Of Two-Game Series

Topper's Injury "No Accident" Boston Coach Accuses Lindsay

Doctors say severe facial cuts and complicated fractures sustained by Jerry Toppazzini in a collision with Detroit's Ted Lindsay will sideline the Boston Bruins right winger for the rest of the National Hockey League season.

Bruins coach Milt Schmidt accused the veteran Detroit player of deliberately leaping at Toppazzini during a scramble for the puck in Thursday night's game in Detroit, won by the third-place Bruins 1-0.

"There was no accident about that," said Schmidt in the Boston dressing room minutes after Toppazzini's injury that came with less than three minutes to play.

Lindsay drew a major penalty for high-sticking and when he protested the call to referee Red Storey, got a 10-minute misconduct penalty which carries with it an automatic \$25 fine.

Visitors Express Dissent As Fouls Make Vital Difference

Displaying team prowess in shooting, passing and scoring two of the top talented basketball squads in the northwestern metropolis in the Civic Centre last night to do battle.

And when the smoke had cleared in the hotly contested fixture, Prince Rupert All-Stars had eked out a 59-54 victory over Ketchikan Sourdoughs to take the first of a two-night exhibition series.

He said the squad is tied for first place with Eagles in the Ketchikan Senior League.

On last night's game he stated: "The floor is a little smaller than what we're used to and that makes for rougher play."

He added the Rupert squad were shooting well and Sourdoughs should be acquainted with the floor for the game to-night promising a tough battle.
