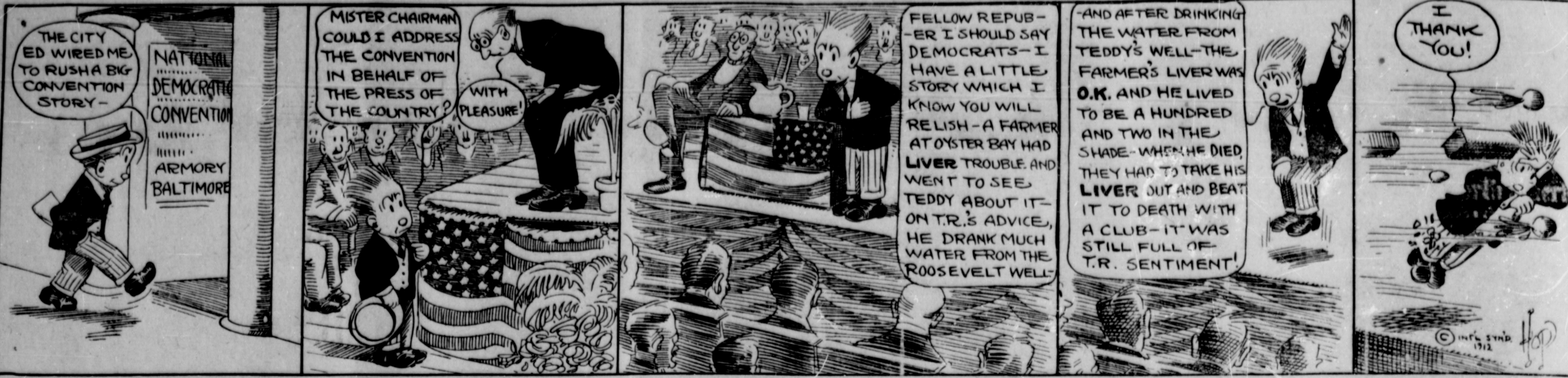


Bryan's Cross of Gold Speech Has Nothing on Scoop

Magistrate Carss held his court this morning for the first time in the fine, new court room in the city hall. There were only two cases, those arising out of the fracas that took place in the early hours of Saturday morning. John Kelly, who seems to have acted under extreme provocation, was committed for trial on the charge of wounding with a knife. Dan McInnis, foreman for J. Hidditch, who was complainer in this case, was shown to have been around early in the evening in an intoxicated condition and giving a great deal of trouble. He was fined \$25 and \$2 costs and severely reprimanded by the magistrate for using coarse and obscene language in the public streets and acting in a disorderly manner generally.

THE HOSPITAL AND EXPENSES

Satisfactory Monthly Report Received by the Board the Other Day—Meals Are Supplied at Remarkably Low Average Cost.

Receipts by the General Hospital during the past month amounted to \$82234.50, and expenditure to \$20414.73, giving an excess of revenue over expenditure of \$19377, which is considered satisfactory by the board at their meeting last week, though with a new building ahead every economy is necessary.

The monthly report of the secretary as to the cost of the kitchen supplies and the help for the month showed that the meals, including the cost of the coal used in the kitchen and the cook's way and that of her assistant, had been only 21.84 cts. apiece.

In the matter of the contracts with the city employees the matter was left over until the council had ascertained the wishes of the employees in the matter.
