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LIBERALS WIN OUT WELL OVER SASKATCHEWAN

SASKATCHEWAN ELECTIONS; TIDE SETS FOR LIBERALISM

LARGE PROPORTION OF SEATS CAPTURED FROM CONSERVATIVES AT PROVINCIAL BATTLE OF POLITICS JUST CONCLUDED—NO RIOTING OR ILL FEELING RECORDED.

Regina, July 12.—(12:30 a. m.)—In the elections in Saskatchewan yesterday the following were elected:
South Qu'Appelle — Railton, Liberal, conceded the election by 50 of a majority, with three polls to hear from.
Estevan — Eight polls give George Bell, Liberal, 22 of a majority.

Arm River—Nine polls give G. A. Scott, Liberal, 189 majority, with 24 polls to hear from.

Moose Mountain—Fifteen polls give Magee, Liberal, 31 of a majority, with fourteen polls to hear from.

As far as heard from other centres results are as follows:

Conservatives elected — Willembury, Moose Jaw; Bradshaw, Prince Albert; McDonald, North Qu'Appelle; Wylie, Maple Creek; Laycock, Eagle Creek.

Liberals elected—Bole, Regina; McNab, Saskatoon; Railton, South Qu'Appelle; Bell, Estevan; Magee, Moose Mountain; Premier Scott, Swift Current; Cunningham, Pheasant Hills; Scott, Arm River; Cawthorpe, Biggar.

LATEST FROM HAZELTON, RAILS NEAR, MINES RIGHT

IMPORTANT DEVELOPMENTS MAY BE EXPECTED IN A VERY SHORT TIME FROM MINES CLOSE TO THE UP RIVER CITY, WHICH HAS BEEN PREPARING FOR COMING OF STEEL.

That there are possibilities untold in the mining properties about Hazelton becomes more and more evident as development of these tremendously rich mountain masses of ore proceeds. With the railway now within a few miles of Hazelton there will be something of a boom before long, when the mines begin to ship ore. A talk with C. H. Sawie, who has visited almost every mine in the Hazelton district in independent investigation, reveals an interesting stage of Hazelton's progress in sight.

Much Ore Ready.
On the Nine Mile mountain, which is practically a mass of different ore veins, some of the famous mines, such as the Harris claims and the Silver Standard group, have carried development so far on that they have ore piled ready for shipment as soon as transportation means reach reasonable distance. At the Silver Standard mine you can walk over piled ore in cribs to the value of \$60,000, while what remains below the surface simply surpasses imagination. The ore taken out is only that which had to be taken out anyway from a shaft being sunk to reach deeper development works.

Rocher de Boule Good.
Great things are expected of Rocher de Boule group in the near future. It is known definitely that a very large ore body has been found in the course of development of that property, and the ore unearthed in large quantities and in regular vein is of marvelously high grade. There is chalcopryite ore and the gray copper ore, with which much silver is associated, and indications are that a regular mass of the very finest mineral is available, measurable by the thousand in tons.

Hazelton's Other Aspects.
In many other aspects Hazelton prospers exceedingly. There is the rapid work on the railway, which will be in New Hazelton very soon now. There is the development of the district agriculturally, a very important aspect. There are the coal and water power prospects, too vast to be set forth in small space. Hazelton is talking mines, manufactures and agriculture in strong, practical style today, and Hazelton men declare that Hazelton can deliver the goods when the time comes. The time is almost at hand today.

FIVE NEEDED FOR A QUORUM LAST NIGHT SAW BUT FOUR

Over a Mysterious Financial Proposition the Mayor and His Municipal Advisers Fall Out---Considerable Differences of Opinion Exist and There is a Demand for Information ---After Much Futile Talk, Two Abandon Board and Affairs End in a Sad Fizzle

In response to an announcement that an offer had been received for the treasury certificates still undisposed of by the city, a special meeting of the City Council somewhat unwillingly assembled in the city hall last night, and a desultory sort of discussion, full of disagreement, was held. The meeting finally fizzled out as two members, Alderman Montgomery and Alderman Maitland, felt so thoroughly at variance with the others and with the Mayor that they left the board. Ignoring their departure, the remaining four continued to debate, still beating the air, but by and by Alderman Douglas suddenly woke up to the fact that there was no quorum present and the four faithful faded away. Nothing definite was done. Nothing could be done.

Problem Before Them.
Close on \$400,000 worth of treasury paper remained to be covered and there is of that \$115,000 due to the Provincial government. The offer made by

the Mayor was for the purchase of the stock at 98 without the three-quarter commission. The Bank of Montreal did not particularly welcome the proposition. The Council talked it over. First of all a lengthy discourse on the situation was contributed by His Worship the Mayor, who said he had been informed that the certificates could be sold for 98, but was not allowed to mention names. He himself thought the offer a good one. Other members thought much otherwise and wanted information, names, facts, details. Alderman Morrissey demanded the whole proposition in writing.

Let the Bank Act.
The Mayor was not inclined to follow Alderman Morrissey's suggestion. He declared there were good reasons against the giving out of details, and the person

making the proposition did not wish his name to appear. The Mayor thought the Council should find this acceptable. But the Council did not apparently find it acceptable. Alderman Maitland wanted the proposition to come through the bank in business manner. If the bank approved it then there might be reason for accepting it. But the Mayor could not say that the bank approved the proposition.

Talk ran to and fro across the council board until both Alderman Montgomery and Alderman Maitland tired of the futile discussion and left. Still the faithful four—the Mayor, Alderman Douglas, Alderman Dybbavn and Alderman Morrissey—stayed with it. The did not constitute a quorum, so what they did didn't count, but as a matter of fact they did nothing. When Alderman Douglas noticed that they had no quorum the four dispersed themselves, folding their tents like the Arabs and silently stealing away.
