WELCOME TO PREMIER AND OPENING OF WHARF

PRINCESS MAY ARRIVES 2 P. M.; PREMIER SIR RICHARD M'BRIDE IS WELCOMED BY THRONGS

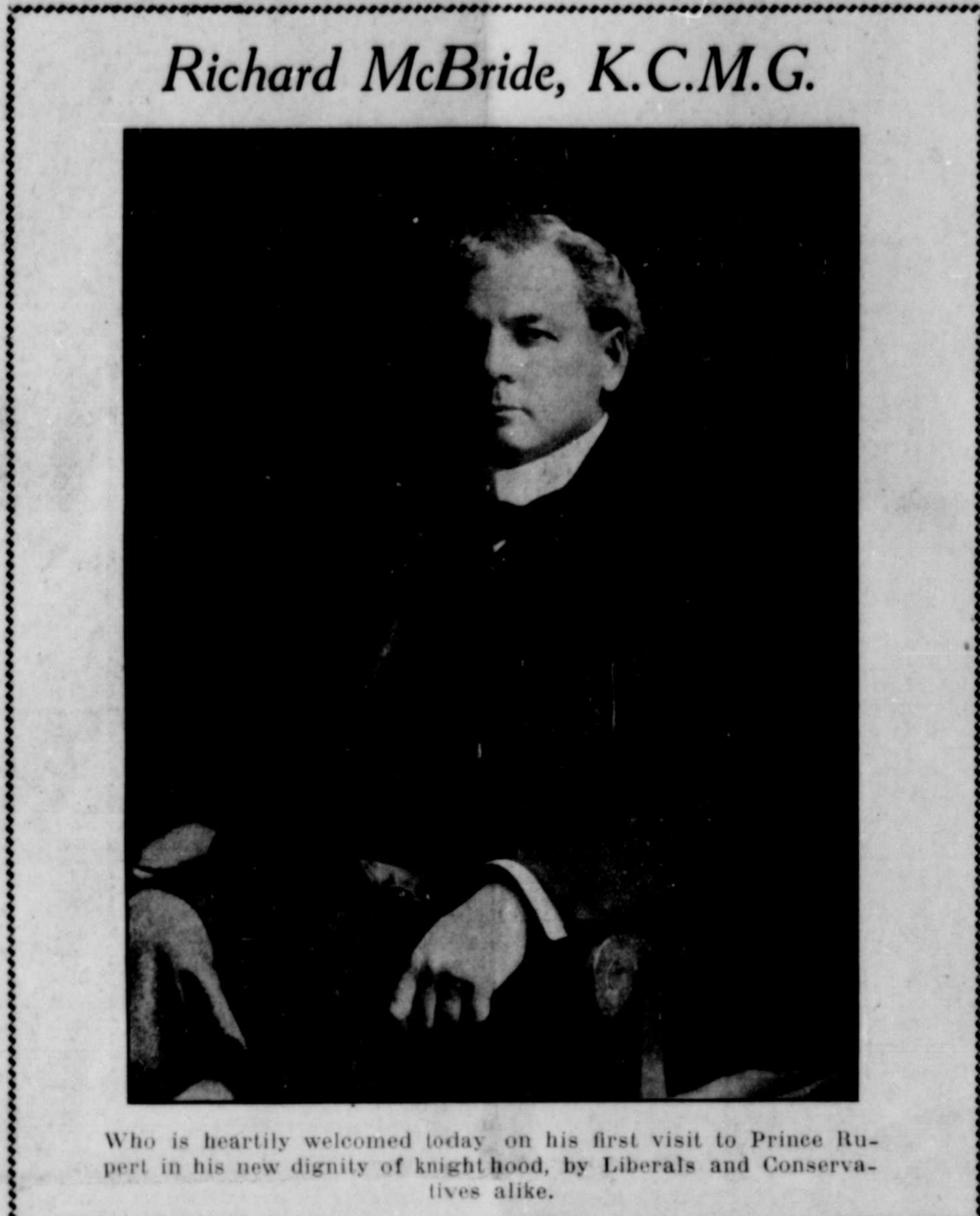
Official announcement was made this morning by the C. P. agent here that the Princess May would arrive punctually at 2 p. m. Arrangements have been made in very creditable style for the welcoming of the Premier. Through the efforts of the decoration committee, aided by willing helpers, amongst whom are mentioned Shes Thompson of the Longshoremen's union, the Government wharf has been decked out with arches bearing appropriate mottoes and venues of evergreens. Banners float everywhere around there and the scene is a gay one.

Procession at Sea.
On the Dominion government launch Evelyn the reception committee set out at 1:30 to meet the day and escort the Premier to the wharf. The city band, on board the Eleanor Mac, also meets the May, and as many

launches as can will join the procession. On the first arch at the wharf, which will be opened by the Premier today, there is the legend, "A hearty welcome to you, Sir Richard," and a farther arch bears a quotation from Proverbs saying, "The king delighteth to honor his faithful servant."

Meeting in Theatre.
After the opening of the wharf Premier McBride will be kept busy viewing the city and receiving certain deputations with affairs for his attention.

For the meeting to be held in the evening in the Westholm Theatre there will be few addresses outside of those given by the Premier and Mr. Bowser. The meeting will be presided over by G. D. Tite, the chairman of the citizens' committee. William Manson, the member for the district, and Dr. Kergin, the vice chairman of the citizens' committee, will speak briefly.

ORIGINATOR OF OVERSEAS CLUB VISITS PRINCE RUPERT AND ADDRESSES MANY

A well attended public meeting was held under the auspices of the Overseas Club in McIntyre Hall on Saturday evening to listen to addresses by its organizers, Mr. Evelyn Wrench and his sister, Miss Wrench, who are on a visit to the coast. The chair was taken by Mayor Newton, and Mr. Frank A. Ellis, the president of the local club, occupied a seat upon the platform. Mr. Wrench and his sister, who are both clever and entertaining speakers, were accorded a hearty reception and were listened to with the greatest of attention during their interesting and instructive addresses. Mr. Wrench outlined the short history of the club, from its inception some six years ago to the present time, with its three hundred and fifty organized clubs and ninety thousand members, a third of which membership is in the Dominion of Canada. Mr. Wrench, who is a poli-

ished and fluent platform speaker, in a few terse sentences pointed out the objects and aims of the club, also dispelling from the minds of his hearers any ideas that the movement smacked in the least of jingoism or self advertisement, or was anti-American in any manner of way. There were other aims in life than the pursuit of the dollar, also naval and military matters were not the sole object in the formation of the club. Rather the binding together of the different portions of the empire, the purifying of public life and the raising of the standards by which the social life of its communities are ruled. These were objects worthy of their most strenuous efforts. It is expected ultimately that a club headquarters will be opened in London, where visiting members will always feel welcome when foregathering from the many parts of the dominions beyond the seas.

MAGNIFICENT MARATHON RUN AT THE GREAT GAMES IN SWEDEN; CANADIANS WIN LAURELS

(Special to Daily News.)
Stockholm, July 15.—South Africa and Canada divided the honors at the Olympic meet today, the former capturing the marathon race, the most important number on the Olympic programme, and George Hodgson of Canada setting a new world's record and winning the chief swimming event, the final in the 100 metre race. The winner of the classical marathon was K. K. McArthur, a tall Transvaal policeman. His compatriot, W. C. Gillew, came second into the stadium, several hundred yards behind, and third to appear was the American, Graston Strobino, of the South Paterson Athletic Club, who put up a braver fight than most of the runners, for his feet were skinned and bleeding and he was suffering great pain. He never lost his nerve though, and made a brave attempt at feeling happy while he traversed the stadium track a furlong behind

the second man at the end of the performance.

The times as announced were: McArthur, 2 hours 36 minutes; Gitchaw, 2 hours 37 minutes 52 second; Strobino, 2 hours 38 minutes 42 1/4 seconds. The Americans gave a death blow to the theory that the athletes of the United States are better at contests which require quickness and agility than in tests of endurance.

Port Alberni, July 15.—Two hundred dollars was the fine imposed on each of the proprietors of the Arlington and Somass Hotels of Alberni and Port Alberni, respectively, for having supplied liquor to an auto driver while he was under the influence of drink. SWEEPING MAJORITY FOR LIBERALS IN SASKATCHEWAN; DETAILS FROM REGINA

Regina, July 15.—With Rosewood and Lloydminster now definitely placed in the Liberal columns, it appears almost certain that the best the Conservatives can hope for in the new legislature is seven members, showing a Liberal majority of forty in the house. At the present time six seats are all they can claim, viz: Ramsden, Moose Jaw, Prince Albert (city), North and South of Appelle and Maple Creek. Shellbrook is still in doubt,

but the result in this constituency should be known tomorrow. Pinto Creek, with eight polls heard from, gives S. R. Moore (Liberal) 77 majority. Thirty polls are still to come, and the Liberals claim that the majority will run into the hundreds.

A PRINCELY WELCOME TO THE PREMIER.

Sir Richard McBride, Premier of British Columbia, arrives today on his first visit to Prince Rupert since he was honored with knighthood by the King. There are people who practice the pronunciation of "Sir Richard" continually in conversation with their friends, seemingly trying to find the most impressive way of mouthing the "Sir," and there are others more apt to remember the premier than the knight. These others are alike in Liberal or Conservative ranks. Opposed in politics, they have nevertheless a common aim and a great one. They are men big enough to respect each other while they differ, and to pay due honor to the Premier of the Province, which is their pride for the credit of Prince Rupert, their city. Because there is a predominance of such men in Prince Rupert, Prince Rupert's welcome to Premier Sir Richard McBride today is a princely one in which the whole community willingly shares.

PORCHER ISLAND'S LITTLE PRESENT.

Once when Victoria was queen there was a great open air reception given in her honor, at which she received from the tiny daughter of an earl a bouquet of exotics from the noble lord's conservatories. Later, as the royal carriage was being driven homeward, it is said that a little village girl, daughter of a market gardener, managed to attract the gracious Queen's attention with a handful of cottage garden flowers. Today, while Prince Rupert does all honor to the Premier, Porcher Island shyly presents him with a basket of its own grown strawberries, dew wet, and with the delicate flavor of the northern garden. Sir Richard is not royal, and some may think there is no parallel between Premier's attention and Queen's. Yet Premier McBride represents the government at Victoria, the city named after the great Queen, and the Premier's Victoria, in the provincial sense, can do much for Porcher Island, coming market garden district of Prince Rupert.

NEWS OF RICH STRIKE OF PLACER GOLD IS CAUSING A STAMPEDE TO FRENCH CREEK

Revelstoke, July 12.—Is there to be repeated in the Big Bend district the history of the sixties, when 5,000 miners stampeded from all parts of the world to the famous placer fields on the tributaries of Old Gold stream, namely, French Creek and McCullough Creek, 75 miles north of Revelstoke? It looks so, for prospectors by twos and threes every night for the past month have been leaving town at all hours, by stealth, on foot and on horseback, bound for the French Creek placer diggings, whilst many placer claims have been staked out and are still being staked.

The cause of the stampede is the news of a rich strike of placer gold in French Creek, along an old channel, discovered by three prospectors, who for over a year have been quietly prospecting this channel. The pay is stated to be big, and the probability is that French Creek will yield millions in yellow metal.

Between the years 1860 and 1865 the old workings on French Creek yielded in the neighborhood of \$3,000,000 to the hundreds of miners and prospectors who worked its rich gravels to bed rock. At that time a typical boom mining town was established, with a population of from three to four thousand people, with its usual accessories in the shape of saloons, dance halls and billiard rooms, and today the curious hunter can still see the remains of this once famous placer camp with its dismantled billiard tables and shacks.

For years past miners and prospectors have been looking for an under channel on French Creek, which was known to exist from the very nature of the ground. This has been found only within the past year, and is believed to be as rich or richer than the workings along the present creek, from which so many millions were extracted in the sixties.

For a number of years the well known placer mining man, Mr. A. Bradley, has been constantly at work on French Creek, developing and prospecting at an enormous expense to himself and his associates. His belief in French Creek is undiminished, his faith is shown this year in the fact that he has purchased a steam placer drill, which he is putting on the ground on French Creek for the purpose of more easily and expeditiously prospecting his claims, believed to be richer in yellow metal than any placer mines in British Columbia. When it is remembered that owing to the absence of a railway, Mr. Bradley's boilers, engines, drills, etc., had to be taken apart and packed into the mine, over 40 miles of a trail on pack horses, it will be understood that his knowledge of the camp must fully warrant such an undertaking.

Mr. J. H. Montgomery, who, with other local men, has placer ground on this new strike, is now in Seattle interesting prominent mining men of that city in his new property on French Creek, and will return in a few days to commence to actively work the new ground. Mr. Warren Andrews and Hart Munro have located along side the Montgomery property, being between this property and that owned by R. A. Millard and associates, who are operating now along the old channel with marked results.

The surrounding ground is being staked as fast as men and horses can reach there from Revelstoke by a forced drive. The steamer Revelstoke makes two trips each week up the river to Downie Creek, 40 miles; from Downie Creek to French Creek is 30 to 35 miles, over a pony trail. There is also a pony trail all the way from Revelstoke to French Creek, and two days' ride will negotiate this trail.

The government of British Columbia are now spending thousands of dollars in the Big Bend district between Revelstoke and French Creek, with a view to giving early access to the lode, as well as placer grounds of the district. The Premier has promised a railway through this wealthy timber and mineral district, and it is expected that within three years there will be such a railway, even if the C. P. R. do not make this natural river grade their route for the proposed double track through the mountains at a still earlier date.

The gigantic mineral, timber and water power resources of the Big Bend district have always been regarded as the greatest asset of the interior of British Columbia, and an immense impetus will be given to the city of Revelstoke and the whole southern interior of British Columbia by the development of this Big Bend country.

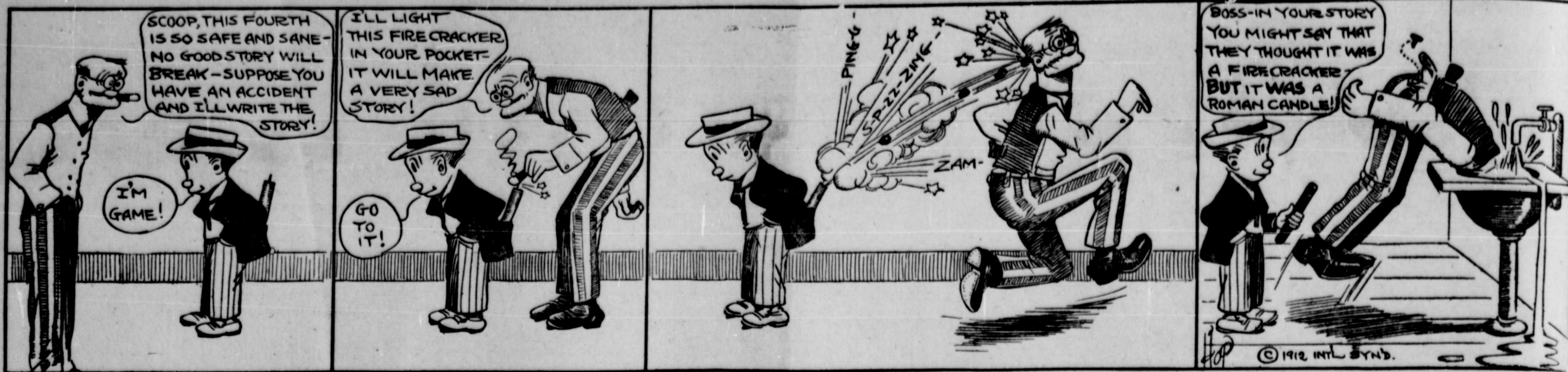

PREMIER'S ROSY PICTURE OF PROVINCE

Victoria, July 13.—At the annual meeting of the Board of Trade today Sir Richard McBride reviewed the progress being made for the furtherance of the railway programme in hand and projected, and dealt with the financial position of the province. He drew a picture of progress and prosperity. Speaking of the finances, the Premier said that there is on deposit in the banks to the credit of the government no less a sum than nine million dollars. He estimated that the railway work in hand or shortly to be inaugurated would in itself involve an expenditure of one hundred millions. Double tracking the C.P.R. to the coast would mean that the sum of twenty-five to thirty millions would be expended in British Columbia. The Canadian Northern had progressed so well that it will shortly be possible to run accommodation trains from the coast to Kamloops, and the whole line will be in operation in two years.

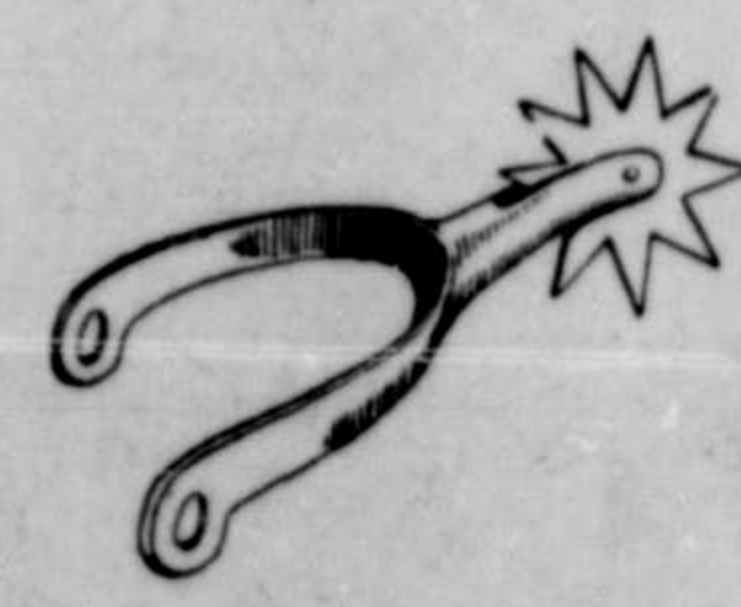

Jogging Laziness into Activity



The merchant whose business lags in the summer has himself to thank.

To slacken the selling pace in the hot season—to lessen Advertising activity—indicates a resignation which has no place in modern business.
