COUNCIL IS CONFIDENT IN ITS VIRTUE

The Prince Rupert Board of Trade came in for severe criticism—one might almost say censure—at the hands of the City Council last evening over the discussion of a letter from the former body requesting assurance from the Mayor and City Council that law and order would be maintained in the event of a strike or other labor troubles taking place in the city. It was considered out of place and entirely unnecessary to send any such communication to the City Council. In the first place, the Council held that there was no strike threatened, everything being perfectly peaceful in the city, and in the second, the city fathers maintained that there were absolutely no grounds for supposing that they would do otherwise than act in the best interests of the city should any such contingency such as that suggested arise.

PILES PAID IN DUTY SUM OF \$18,000 HERE

At the dry dock work is pressing on with great rapidity. The piling placed to date is already assuming imposing proportions and is admitted by engineers to be the best on the Prince Rupert waterfront. Two large scow loads of new creosoted piles reached here this week-end from Seattle, and paid in duty to the local Customs department office no less a sum than \$18,000. One scow load paid \$5,000 and the other \$13,000. This in itself reveals a practical aspect of the immensity and expense of this great undertaking.

The city is to be guarded against the possibility of being involved in a legal impasse in the matter of the arrangement made between Mr. Weston and the party taking over the contract by the watchful eye of the city solicitor. It is probable that Robert McCook, who at present is working for Mr. Weston, will take it over, if it can be so arranged with the latter.

LARGEST PILE SHIPMENT EVER SENT TO CITY

Mr. Burroughs, the local manager of the Lester W. David Co., in receipt of a wire to the effect that the large barge of creosoted material, which is some days past due, being shipped by his company for the dry dock work, has been delayed by reason of the tug Lady of the Lake, which is towing the barge, breaking down and having to lay in for repairs before she could proceed. The shipment is one of the largest ever moved on the Pacific coast and much interest is manifested at its arrival, which, according to Mr. Burroughs' advice, should be tomorrow or Thursday.

SUSPECTED BLIND PIG TOOK TO THE WATER THIS MORNING POLICE HAD EXCITING CHASE

By devious means information reached the city police force this morning that there had been detected about the Indian gasoline boat "White Crow," owned by Amos Collison, a very suspicious odor of brandy and other spirituous liquor. The White Crow was perched (so to speak) down at the waterfront and certain white men, it was alleged, had been seen to go aboard of her. They were suspected of having the liquor in

their possession and a case of "supplying" seemed imminent. Constable Bailey, himself a sailor of the seven seas, was instantly on the qui vive. He made for the waterfront ready to effect an arrest, but somehow warning tidings had reached the White Crow. When the police reached the scene that bird of a boat was speeding seaward. But Constable Bailey was not to be balked. Swiftly he chartered the Laura F., George Frizzell's

flyer, and set out to overhaul the fugitive White Crow, blind pig or whatever she might be. There was an exciting race. The Laura F. won. In triumph she came within hailing distance, the police ordered the White Crow to heave to and boarded her. After examination the Indian boat was towed back to the waterfront, while her occupants were taken up town to answer for their wild flight from the police boat.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS FOR RUPERT

Professor Adam Shortt, chairman of the Civil Service Commission for the Dominion, in paying a visit to Prince Rupert this week-end has made an important statement. In view of the increasing number of probable applicants for civil service positions who have their homes in Prince Rupert and the number of senior scholars who may be desirous of sitting civil service examinations, he is willing that Prince Rupert may be made a civil service examination centre so that those sitting the examinations may be saved the expense and trouble of going south. Professor Shortt is also taking up statistical matters regarding the provinces in relation to the Dominion statistical work.

La Junta, Colo., Aug. 5.—Yesterday, battling desperately for every inch of ground he gave before a posse led by five deputy sheriffs and wounded almost to death, George Bell, the Tennessee gun man, retreated behind a hay stack three miles southwest of here at 11 o'clock and fired a bullet through his brain. Bell, after shooting five persons, two of whom are in a critical condition, and setting fire to a summer resort hotel at South Platte on Friday night, fled to the hills and has been hunted by a dozen posses since then.

CITY CLEANSING CONTRACT.

Last year when the predecessors of the present City Council awarded that scavenging contract to Mr. Weston there were all kinds of street rumors that a monopoly had been created in an important and profitable department of city work. Soreheads dreading neglect by the supposed monopolist, and fearing over charge for cleansing services, voiced their views. Things, however, went fairly smoothly with only the usual series of minor difficulties almost invariably associated with the scavenging of cities. Now it seems that the presumed monopoly is by no means as desirable as people imagined. The first holder of the franchise for city cleansing is desirous of relinquishing his contract, but arrangements for its transfer hang fire. This is a matter which cannot too soon be settled satisfactorily by the City Council. Prince Rupert's record for health is too good to be trifled with, and a few weeks' neglect in the direction of city cleansing might sow seeds of serious and costly trouble.

A CITY WELL GOVERNED.

Governor Woodrow Wilson, the Democratic candidate for the United States presidency, it is interesting to note, paid a notable tribute the other day to the excellence of Glasgow's city government. After pointing out that in Scotland cities are governed by one assembly composed of three representatives from each district, one of whom retires annually, he said that nobody in Glasgow ever gets a chance to vote for more than one person each year, and that his course and that of the council and its various committees in charge of departments can be easily followed.

TRIBUTE TO CITY OF GLASGOW.

Glasgow, he continued, has one of the simplest and best governments in the world, and it undertakes things that cities in the United States would not be allowed to undertake, and yet without suspicion even of graft, or bargain, or private arrangement. He did not think that the Scots were more honest than the United States people, although shrewder in some respects. "There is," he concluded, "no more patriotic civic interest in the city of Glasgow than there is in our cities, but the city of Glasgow owns its own government and the voters of our cities do not own theirs."

ENTERTAINMENT AT THE CITY HALL.

No matter how attractive a show comes to town nowadays the good old city hall vaudeville proves a fail-me-never, able to hold its own against all comers in the line of humorous time killing stunts. Last night a small audience at the city hall enjoyed comedy in real life almost as comical as the fare provided for the larger audience at the opera house. True, the harmony was lacking, likewise the feminine element, but the stage atmosphere is ever well to the fore in city halls where accusations of "playing to the gallery" and "monopolizing the spot light," "handing bouquets" and even "facing the music" are frequently applied. This morning those who preferred the city hall to the opera house are telling their friends that the local vaudeville lacked only the presence of the city band to make it as good as the best road show. The episode in which an applicant for consideration in connection with the city cleansing contract calmly usurped the seat of the chairman of the Board of Works and sat facing the Mayor to the consternation of the Finance Minister was only one of the evening's joys.

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"GAMBLERS HAVE COURT'S PROTECTION"

Montreal, Aug. 5.—The Police Commissioners Waldo and Smith in a statement tonight relative to the Rosenthal case recommended a thorough investigation of the charges regarding the alleged connection between the police and gamblers. At the same time he said "gambling can exist only because gamblers can obtain what amounts to protection from courts." He asserts that gamblers do much of the corrupt election work of political parties that place the judges on the bench. It was reported at police headquarters that detectives were close on the trail of "Lefty" Louie, and "Gyp the Blood," the two remaining yeggmen sought in connection with the murder.

The London auxiliary worked for 12 hours clearing up the wreck.

OLD MOUNT M'KINLEY IS STILL KING

Fairbanks, Alaska, Aug. 5.—Prof. Herschell Park, of Columbia University, and Belmore Browne, of Tacoma, arrived at Tolvina on the Tanana river late last night and reported that they failed to reach the summit of Mount McKinley. Two attempts were made, one on the north and the other on the south peak. An altitude of 20,200 feet was reached on the south peak, and 19,000 feet on the north peak. A few weeks ago it was reported that they had succeeded.

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
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
