

TINY 35-FOOT POWER BOAT CROSSES ATLANTIC

GRANBY BAY TO HAVE A SMALL CITY RIGHT BESIDE SMELTER; WILL BE BENEFIT TO RUPERT

Close on the news of the development shortly of an important suburb in Port Edward, close to Prince Rupert, comes news of another highly important new townsite development. The town in this case is to be at Port Granby, or Granby Bay. It will be a smelter city, the townsite being adjacent to the Granby Company's mining camp and smelter site. The smelter, in course of erection now, is within a few hundred feet of the new townsite.

Clearing the Townsite.

Within a day or two clearing of the townsite will begin and about thirty acres of well located land will be put in readiness for business and residential occupancy. Already some enterprising persons have settled there, not waiting for the lots to go on the market, as the Granby Company's mining operations, smelter building and gradually growing pay roll attract business ventures. The townsite, it is expected, will be put on the market shortly.

Population Now 400.

About 400 persons, including the workers on the Granby Bay mining development, are located at present at Granby Bay, and owing to the promise of the locality and district generally many more will settle there as the smelter plant develops and opens up. There are water powers, lumbering prospects, mining, wharfage opportunities and even the possibility of a Ground Hog railway terminus as attractions for the establishment of a thriving community at this point and a further important point in view of the establishment of a new town at Granby Bay is the fact that there will be employed there steadily when the smelter is running a pay roll of upward of \$100,000 to \$150,000. At Phenix where the ore could be worked like a quarry the pay roll was \$90,000. At Granby more men will be required to mine the ore, and the pay roll will inevitably be larger.

SUPPLY OF ELECTRIC POWER TO CITY AND BIG CONSUMERS PROPOSAL BEFORE COUNCIL

An important letter and draft bylaw regarding the supplying of electric power to the city of Prince Rupert and to all consumers using over ten horse power electric machinery in their business has been addressed today to the Mayor and City Council by the Prince Rupert Hydro-Electric Company, Limited.

The company stands ready to bind itself by written contract to the terms set forth in the bylaw, which is similar to those passed by municipalities adjacent to Vancouver.

In the letter special attention

is called to the rates quoted by the company for power. These work out with the present city load to 1.56 cents per kilowatt hour and \$3.50 per horse power year. As more power is required the rates shrink to 1.31 cents per kilowatt hour and \$28.10 per horse power year.

The bylaw provides detailed regulations regarding pole lines and the supply of power, including rates equivalent to the above-mentioned, and while reserving for the city right to supply practically all light and all power to consumers of less than ten horse power, expressly provides that it

shall not confer upon the Hydro Electric Company any exclusive right or powers, and shall not be construed to confer such monopoly.

The draft bylaw provides for a forty year agreement with the city and the whole agreement would become null and void in the event of the company's not turning on a full service of power within two years. As a matter of fact, the company is able to promise full service in eight months.

The letter and bylaw will come up for consideration by the Council in course.

PHONE UP YOUR LAUNCH FAVORITE

CANADIAN NORTHERN RAILWAY OFFICIALS VISIT PRINCE RUPERT WHILE MAKING TOUR OF COAST

Powerful Passenger-Carrying Deep-Sea Tug "Dreadful" in Harbor Today Brings a Distinguished Party of Capitalists and Important Men of Affairs in Railway and Financial World ---Investigate Fisheries and Other Developments

The large and commodious steam tug Dreadful of the Fraser Mills Lumber Company arrived in port yesterday afternoon from Vancouver with a party of prominent British Columbia and eastern capitalists on board. The Dreadful, which is one of the largest tug boats in Northern Pacific coast waters, is a new boat just arrived from England, having been specially built for this company's service. She is on a cruise of the northern waters and left this morning for the Wallace Canneries and Naden Harbor on a tour of inspection.

Distinguished Party.

The party consists of A. D. McRae, president of the Fraser Mills Lumber Company and of the

Wallace Fisheries Company, and also an associate of Sir Donald Mann in the Canadian Northern Railway Company and the Canadian Northeastern Railway Company of the Portland Canal district; Col. Davidson of Toronto, land commissioner of the Canadian Northern Railway Company; George Howe of Minneapolis, E. J. Palmer, general manager of the Victoria Lumber Company; T. J. Humbird of Spokane, J. M. McMillan of Vancouver, president of the Cassiar Packing Company; Peter Wallace of the Wallace Fisheries, and C. F. Stevenson of Swift & Company of Chicago.

Purposes of Visit.

In conversation this morning Mr. A. D. McRae, who is heavily

interested in various enterprises in Northern British Columbia, said that the present visit was chiefly in connection with the fishing and packing industries which is fast assuming such large proportions in the eyes of the monied men of British Columbia and the east generally.

The whaling station at Naden Harbor, another big industry, is comprised amongst the interests of Mr. McRae and his associates, will also come in for a share of their attention. The party expects to spend some little time in looking over the many points of interest in the light of the big development taking place on the coast of Northern British Columbia at the present time.

ROYALTY SIX TIMES IN PERIL

Brussels, Aug. 8.—During a severe storm the other day lightning six times struck the castle of Ciergnon in Southern Belgium, where the Belgian royal family is staying with the Prince Consort of Holland as guests. The members of the royal party were at lunch at the time, but did not lose their self possession. The castle was considerably damaged.

BOY SCOUTS SAVED LIFE OF SUNSTROKE

Chicago, Aug. 8.—Eight Boy Scouts in a special detail hospital corps at West Park No. 3, May and Twentieth streets, saved the life of a man overcome by heat. In view of the crowds expected at the park during the day, Dr. Van Verner, instructor, volunteered the services of the corps. In the afternoon, when the heat was greatest, John Danhoff, Madison and Canal streets, sank to the ground.

The Boy Scouts corps rushed to the fallen man with a stretcher, gathered him up and took him into the hospital tent pitched within the park for the purpose. There the members of the corps, all boys, revived the heat victim with stimulants and treatment.

THAT BRIDGE TO SECTION TWO.

Practically all the Provincial government lots in the already sold sections of the city are to be put on the market this month. There is one section, however, in which the government lots will not be offered at this time. That is Section Two. Section Two was marketed sooner than had been expected by the Grand Trunk Company. Since its sale the section has lain dormant except for two small houses erected on it. It has neither plank roads nor footpaths. Until some better means of crossing Morse Creek hollow exists than the present low level trail there can be no very great development of Section Two. By making a temporary road for teams still, however, at the low level something might be done to start development, but what is needed is a bridge beyond doubt. The G. T. P. sold their lots with never a word of bridge building, though the persistent idea in the citizens' minds is that the bridge can most practically be built by the city, the G. T. P. and the government acting together. Now that the government has decided to delay the sale of these lots in Section Two there are hopes that this means consideration of the urgent request made through the Premier that the government should share in the bridge construction and should use its power with the G. T. P. to enlist the co-operation of that corporation also.

CANADA'S CAPITAL TO COST MORE.

"For some months past we have been hearing from various

quarters reports of a money shortage in England, and municipalities and corporations have been warned against making too heavy offerings. These pessimistic views of the bond market have been voiced from so many sources at once that one is led to suspect a purpose, not entirely unselfish, behind the friendly warnings," says R. J. C. Stead, in the High River Times. "In fact, there is a suspicion that it is a case of shrewdness rather than shortness on the part of the English investor. For ten years we have been hammering in upon him with every means in our power the fact that we are a prodigiously prosperous people.

THE ENGLISH MONEY MAN WAKES UP.

"During the last five years he has begun to believe us. He has been investing in Canada, and as a rule he has found the returns liberal and satisfactory. Of late he has adopted the habit of coming out to Canada and looking the country over for himself. This has made him better acquainted with local conditions and has increased his confidence. But it has also resulted in his making a discovery. He has discovered that the money he is lending at 4 and 5 per cent. is being used by the man on the spot in many cases to earn 10, 15 and even 20 per cent. In short, he has come to the conclusion that he is furnishing the money which makes the present development of Western Canada possible, but he is not getting his share of the profits. At least, he is not getting as much as he might, and in money matters that is the only limit.

THE AWAKENING OF THE FISH INDUSTRY ON THE ISLANDS; DOUGHTY PLANS PROGRESS

Good news has been received from Mr. Wilfrid V. Doughty to the effect that salmon are running in large numbers and that the Skidegate cannery is very busy taking care of the catch.

To those who have followed the work undertaken by the B. C. Fisheries, Limited, at Alford Bay and Skidegate under the management of Mr. Doughty, it is a time for congratulations to the energetic manager. Mr. Doughty left Grimsby on the 20th of January of this year and after a short stop in Vancouver and Victoria came on to Prince Rupert. After visiting the site of their proposed operations he immediately proceeded to let contracts for the buildings, with the result that by June 15th the cannery was ready and can making in progress. Now comes the welcome news that the fish are

doing their part in this undertaking.

Mr. Doughty is to be congratulated on obtaining the services of Mr. A. W. Carter as superintendent of the cannery operations. Mr. Carter was for many years successful in the management of the Oceanic cannery, Skeena River.

It is the wish of all interested in the fishing industry that the B. C. Fisheries may fill every can this, their first, season in operation. Sir George Doughty, M. P., chairman of the B. C. Fisheries, Limited, was to have left England about the 25th of July to inspect the works at Queen Charlotte Islands. Their steam trawlers Canada and Triumph left Grimsby the 11th of July and others will follow at an early date.

CANADA'S CAPITAL WILL COST MORE

Montreal, Aug. 9.—"Canadians must realize that they will have to pay more for their money, and the sooner they realize it the better," was the remark made by Mr. Arnold, president of the Dominion Trust Company of Vancouver, on his return from Great Britain.

"The recent failure of Toronto to float its civic loan following similar failures by Vancouver and Montreal calls fresh attention to this whole question of borrowing in the London market. We have been paying too little for our money and hereafter borrowers will be forced to pay more than they have been paying in the past."

Mr. Arnold also emphasized the importance of Canadians using discrimination in the class of securities they offered in the London market.

RAISED ONE DOLLAR CHEQUE TO \$100,000

Berlin, Ont., Aug. 9.—In making search of the personal effects of Abraham Rowenstein, a Russian Jew, arrested on a charge of fraud on Saturday, Chief O'Neill found a new bank book issued by the local branch of the Merchants Bank of Canada, which had a deposit of \$100,000, purporting to have been made on July 26th. On making inquiries at the bank it was ascertained that a deposit of \$1 had been made, and that amount was raised to \$100,000 by Rowenstein. It is supposed that he intended raising the money among his friends in a few days, giving sufficient time to allow the alleged \$100,000 to arrive from New York. The bank book and papers have been forwarded to the police authorities in Toronto.

NEW GOVT. BUILDINGS FOR REGINA

Regina, Aug. 8.—The Provincial government has purchased from the board of Regina Methodist College the entire block now temporarily occupied by the college and the former site of the Victoria Hospital, with a view to erecting a new court house. The building, work upon which will commence in due course, will be one of the finest buildings in Canada and will provide for future expansion.

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SUFFRAGETTES MUST NOW PAY FOR MISCHIEF

London, Aug. 9. — A local tradesman, the windows of whose store were smashed in one of the suffragette riots, was awarded \$75 damages and costs by Judge Woodfall in the Westminster county court today.

The suit was brought against Mr. and Mrs. Pethic Lawrence, joint editors of Votes for Women, and Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, as officers of the society which organized the disturbance. The defendants did not appear in court.

This was the first of a large number of suits which an insurance company has instituted against the defendants, and if the county court judge's decision be upheld by the higher court the defendants will be mulcted in enormous damages.

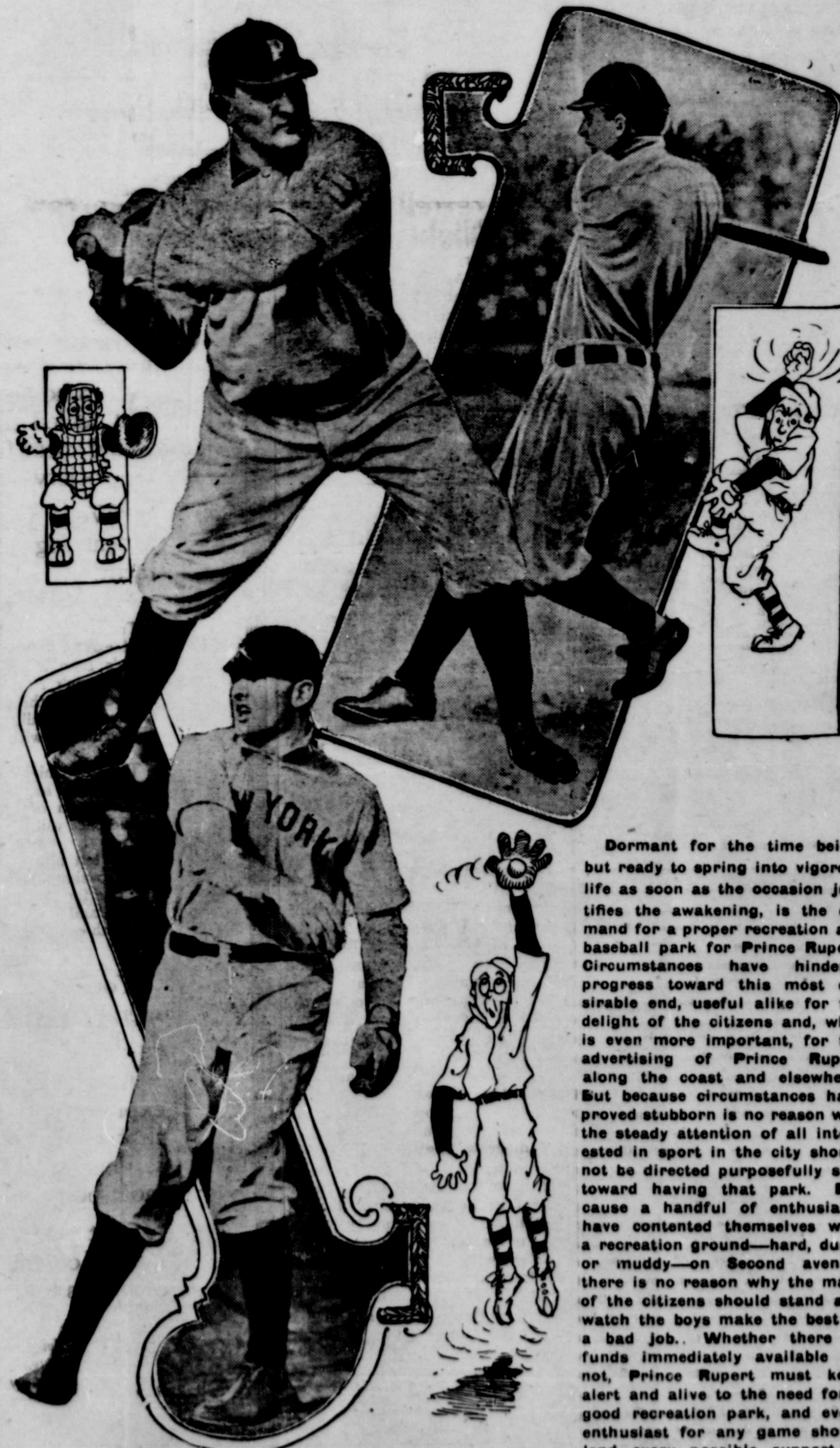

DIAMOND STARS ASHINE BUT UNFORTUNATELY NOT YET ON A PRINCE RUPERT BALL PARK



Dormant for the time being, but ready to spring into vigorous life as soon as the occasion justifies the awakening, is the demand for a proper recreation and baseball park for Prince Rupert.
