## PANAMA TOLLS QUESTION AWAKES WIDE WORLD

### BRITISH SHIPOWNERS ARE INDIGNANT AT AMERICA'S ACTION OVER PANAMA

#### Senate by Big Majority Ratifies Measure Giving U. S. Ships Toll-Free Passage Through Canal Whether Coastwise or Foreign Bound

#### UNDOUBTED VIOLATION OF TREATY

#### Determined Battle Waged in Senate Against the Toll-Free Clause by Two Senators, But Their Efforts are Downed by Overwhelming Opposition---British Maritime Traders Believe Mercantile Marine May Stick to the Old Route and Boycott Canal Unless Force of Opinion Prevails to Alter Action

(Special to Daily News.)  
Washington, Aug. 12.—The Panama Canal administration is providing for free passage to American ships, prohibiting railroad owned vessels from using the waterway and authorizing the establishment of a one man government when the canal is completed, was passed by the Senate by 47 to 15.

Provision for free tolls for United States ships, which was fought out in the Senate on Wednesday, was endorsed again just before the passage of the measure. Opponents of the free toll provision for American ships against which Britain has made formal protest, carried on their fight up to the last moment of the bill's consideration. Just before its passage Senator Root moved to strike out the section giving free tolls to coastwise and American vessels and Senator Hoke Smith moved to strike out the provision for free tolls for American ships in foreign trade. Both motions were defeated overwhelmingly.

Senator Brandegee, in closing the debate, insisted on the provisions of the Senate bill admitting the use by vessels in foreign trade free passage through the canal, an undoubted violation of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty with Great Britain.

London, Aug. 12.—British ship owners are indignant at the United States Senate's action in respect to the Panama Canal. They admit that big trade is waiting to be done as soon as the canal opens, but are inclined to think that the preferential treatment accorded to American ships will make traders stick to old routes. Representatives of old firms expressed the opinion, however, that much might happen before the canal is opened, and protests of the foreign powers might induce a change in the American policy.

Paris, Aug. 12.—Quoting approvingly the American protests against action of the American Senate in passing the Panama Canal bill, which, among other things, provides for remission of tolls to American vessels engaged in coastwise and foreign traffic, the Paris Temps, in an article published today, foresees a tariff war of all powers against the United States unless President Taft vetoes the course "which wrongs interests of the rest of the world and belies the solemn affirmation of the cabinet at Washington that the whole purpose of the work at Panama was in the interest of mankind in general."

#### DOMINION MAY SOON HAVE REGULAR MINISTER OF MINES; NEW PORTFOLIO PREDICTED

(Special to Daily News.)  
Ottawa, Aug. 12.—It is possible that next session will see an additional portfolio created and the west will secure a fourth minister. It is understood that strong influence is being brought to bear by the mining interests to have a minister of mines appointed. Formerly the mines were under the minister of inland revenue, but have been transferred to another department, which, however, is one of

the heaviest of the departments. It is felt that under a full fledged minister the mining industry will be given far more encouragement than in the past. British Columbia is particularly anxious to see a minister of mines appointed. Names suggested for the position are R. B. Bennett, Calgary; J. D. Taylor, New Westminster; Robert Green, Kootenay. The latter is a former minister of mines in the British Columbia government.

#### CANADIAN MINISTERIAL VISIT TO IRELAND CLOSED; BORDEN TO VISIT GLASGOW

London, Aug. 12.—The Canadian ministers' visit to Dublin is now regarded as closed. Hon. C. J. Doherty, who leaves London today for good, will spend a few days in Ireland. The Hon. L. P. Pelletier will accompany him. Hon. J. D. Hazen has decided to sail on the 21 inst. Premier Borden, according to present arrangements, follows two days later. The Premier will spend the week-end with Lord Roberts. His last two public engagements will be receiving the freedom of the city of Glasgow in recognition of his services to the Dominion and attending the launching of the steamer Australian on Friday. Mrs. Borden will perform the christening ceremony on the latter occasion.

#### THE RUSH OF IMMIGRANTS KEEPS COMING

(Special to Daily News.)  
Ottawa, Aug. 12.—During the three months from April 1st to June 30th of the current fiscal year 175,341 immigrants arrived in Canada. Of this number 121,998 arrived at ocean ports and 53,343 from the United States. The figures show an increase of 15 per cent, compared with those of the corresponding months last year.

**THE PANAMA PROTEST**

"The canal shall be free and open to the vessels of commerce and of war observing these rules, on terms of entire equality, so that there shall be no discrimination against any such nation, or its citizens or subjects in respect of the conditions or charges of traffic or otherwise. Such conditions and charges of traffic shall be just and equitable." The "rules" mentioned are rules governing the relations of the canal to warfare and neutrality. The whole quotation is the important provision in clause 1, article III of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, which Great Britain holds has been violated by the United States in the Senate legislation passed giving toll free passage through the Panama Canal to American vessels whether coastwise or foreign. J. H. Turner, agent general for British Columbia in London, has strongly supported the protest movement, arguing that this violation of the treaty would seriously injure British Columbia.

**PROPOSE END OF ITALY'S WAR WITH TURKEY**

London, Aug. 8.—A despatch to a news agency from Constantinople says that the Turkish government has appointed a mission to discuss peace between Turkey and Italy and that it meets the Italian delegates at Lausanne, Switzerland. According to a statement published by the Daily Express the seizure of Tripoli by Italy was due to Italy getting wind of German negotiations at Constantinople to acquire rights in Tripoli by purchase which would be tantamount to giving Germany actual possession of the country.

**MONTENEGRO MAY HAVE WAR WITH TURKEY**

Constantinople, Aug. 8.—Turkey today gave Montenegro 24 hours in which to explain Montenegrin activities on the Turkish frontier. Unless a satisfactory explanation is forthcoming Turkey will sever diplomatic relations at once, and the Turkish

minister notified Montenegro that such action would be followed by war.

The Montenegrins and Albanians are racially related, and Montenegro is also ambitious to get Albania. This, Turkish officials say, accounts for the activities on the Turkish frontier. The Sultan of Turkey is aroused over the activities of Montenegro, and it is expected he will name the strongest man he can find as dictator. Chefket Pasha and Kamil Pasha are prominently mentioned for the dictatorship.

**AUSTRALIA TO SPEND WELL FOR DEFENSE**

Sydney, Aug. 10.—The principal feature of the Commonwealth budget is the proposal to spend almost £4,000,000 on new works and buildings from revenue. Details of the expenditure include the following: For fleet construction, £1,317,000; other naval work, £284,000; military works, £876,000; post office, including wireless, £1,055,000. Other defense expenditures amount to £2,748,000, including provision for full complements for three cruisers, two submarines and a depot ship for the last four months of the year. Ten wireless stations are to be constructed.

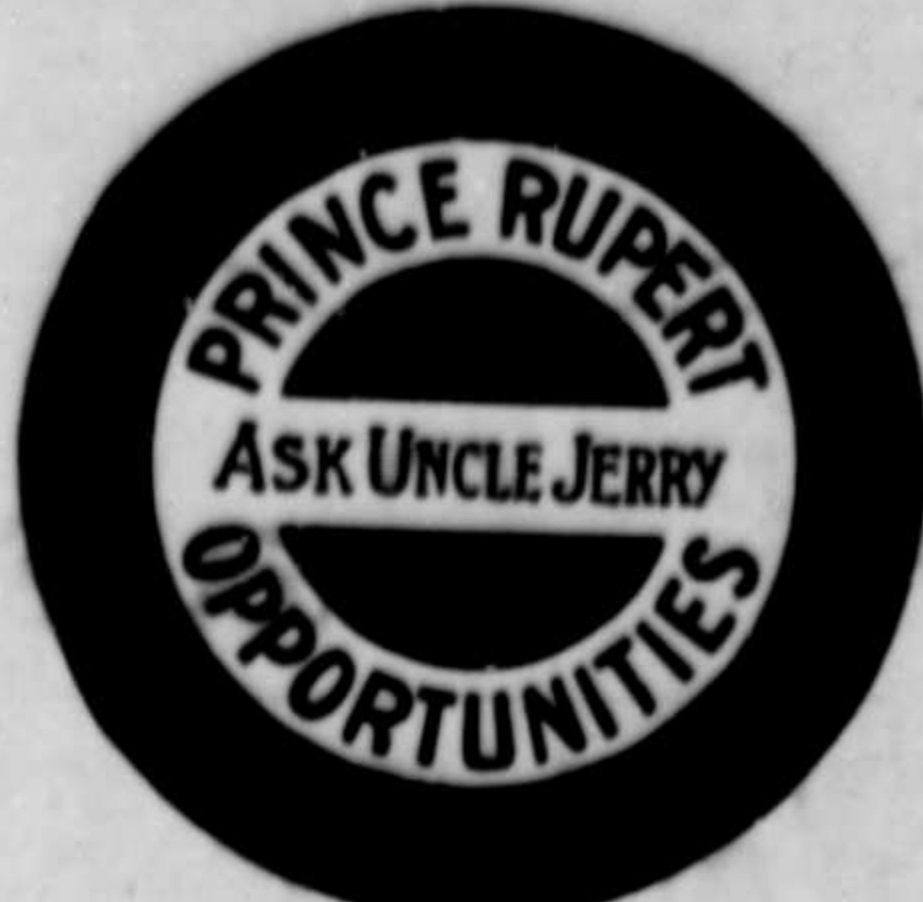

## SEAMEN MAY REFUSE TO MAN C. P. R. EMPRESS

Quebec, August 10.—The C.P.R. liner Empress of Britain was to have left today for England, but there is still something to be done to her bow, and she will not sail before tomorrow morning. She will carry freight and 10 passengers.

It is stated that the firemen stokers and some of the stewards on the Empress of Britain will refuse to sail tomorrow at day break unless they are granted a month's extra wages. It is said that they claim the ship is not seaworthy until after her proper repair in the British dockyard.

## MIRACLE SAVES MILLIONAIRE MOUNTAINEER

Calgary, August 10.—Mr. Selby Walker, son of Colonel James Walker, millionaire, of Calgary, narrowly escaped death on a dangerous slope of Castle Mountain, in the heart of the Canadian Rockies, on Saturday, when he lost his footing and fell a distance of 100 feet. Walker crashed against a boulder, and was saved from being hurled to death over a 500-foot precipice. The young mountaineer suffered three broken ribs and a number of severe lacerations. He was rescued with ropes and carried to the Alpine Club's temporary camp at the foot of the mountain, where he is slowly recovering.

## MONTREAL TRUE TO ITS OWN FIRST BANK

Montreal, Aug. 10.—It has been decided by the city council to accept the offer of the Bank of Montreal to place on the English market a temporary loan of \$750,000 at 4 1/2 per cent., to which has been added commission and stamp dues, bringing the total discount to about 4 3/4 per cent.

When spun into cloth it is said that the result is a fabric fully equal in durability to cotton, while the cost is materially reduced.
