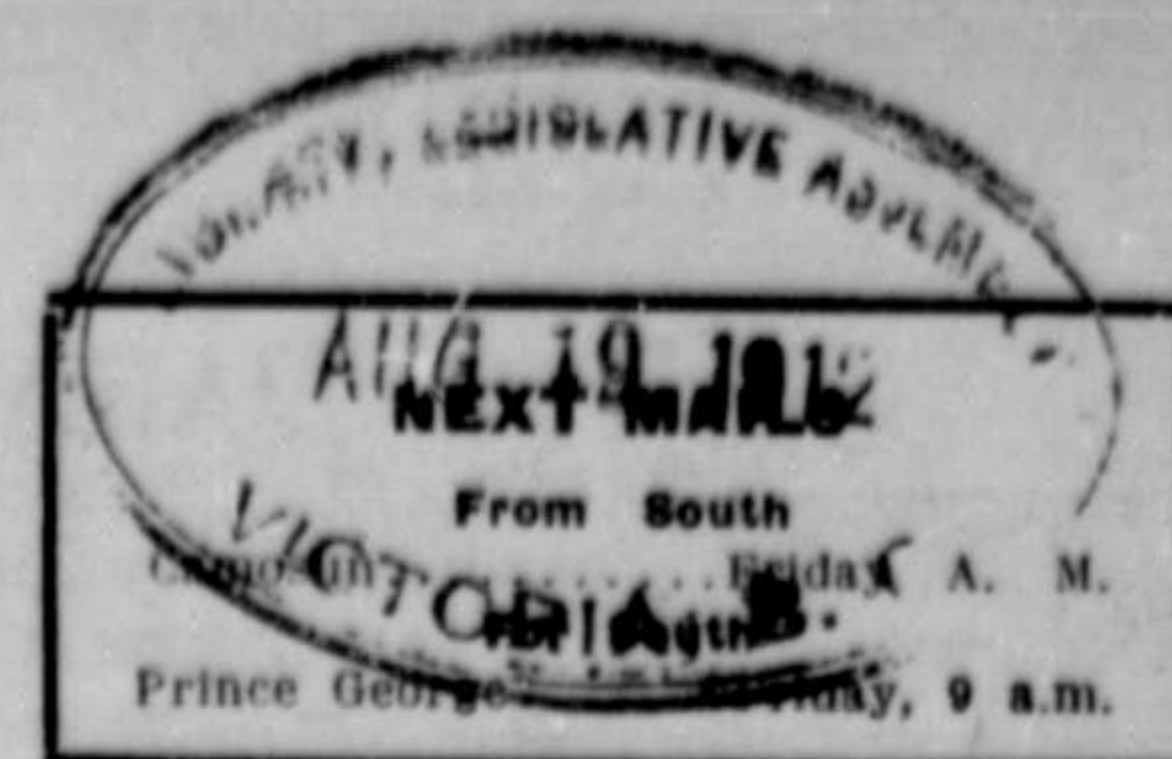

BIG REALTY DEAL: SILVER BAND: STEAMER RISK

S.S. PRINCE GEORGE NEARLY COLLIDED WITH INCOMING S.S. STATE OF CALIFORNIA

The G. T. P. steamer Prince George, which left for Stewart on 8 a. m. this morning, had a narrow escape from a serious collision while leaving harbor in a morning mist. It appears that she crossed in front of the bow of the State of California on its way to this port. So close was the shave between the two boats that it is said one could almost jump from one to the other. The heavy fog that prevailed this morning is the cause of what might have been a serious marine disaster.

RUPERT REALTY MAN MAKES BIG OFFER TO GRAIN EXCHANGE IN FORT WILLIAM, ONTARIO

A few weeks ago Mr. O. M. Helgerson, of Saskatoon, purchased over \$300,000 worth of May street property. He believes it to be one of the coming business streets of the city and wants to see it developed. Believing that he has an ideal site for the Grain Exchange building he is making the following proposition pany, says the Fort William Morning Herald

The first proposal is that he will give the northeast corner of May and Miles streets, being lots 38, 39, 40 and 41, McVicar Addition, with a frontage of 100 feet on May street and 98 feet depth, at the actual cost price to him—\$52,500.

An alternate offer is that he will give the northwest corner of May and Leith streets, being lots 1, 2, 3 and 4, block 210, Carrick Addition, with a frontage of 100 feet on May, and a depth of 100 feet, for \$30,000.

The entire price in each case to be paid for in stock of the company and not to involve any cash outlay.

The offer is subject to the following conditions:

First—That the contract be let for the building and actual construction started within 60 days from date.

Second—That the building cover the entire site and be not less than five storeys high, exclusive of basement, and to cost not less than \$200,000.

Third—That the deed to the property will not be called for before March 1, 1913.

Fourth—That the offer be accepted on or before 12 o'clock noon of Tuesday, July 30, 1912.

If either one of Mr. Helgerson's sites be taken on the terms he stipulates, he will become the heaviest individual stock holder in the Fort William Chamber of Commerce Limited.

Mr. Helgerson came to the city a few days ago with the intention of offering one of these sites absolutely free, being under the impression that the Grain Exchange building was to cost approximately half a million dollars. Finding that this was not the intention of the promoters, he modified his proposal accordingly and now offers the site on the conditions herein outlined.

METLAKATLA'S SPLENDID NEW SILVER INSTRUMENTAL BAND TO GREET DUKE OF CONNAUGHT

Indians of the Neighboring Reserve Have Laid Themselves Out to do Honor to the Duke and Invested \$1600 in the Purchase of the Finest Set of Musical Instruments Ever Supplied to Any Band in All Western Canada

The Metlakatla Indian band may be the champions amongst the Indian bands of Northern British Columbia. At any rate they mean to make an effort to win the distinction with the finest set of band instruments that money can buy.

Have Large Cash Reserve.
A fact of which the public may not be generally aware is that the Metlakatla Indians through the sale of certain lands by the Dominion government to the G. T. P. railway at the time of the inception of this townsite, were beneficiaries to the extent of some \$107,000. One-half of this was paid to them in cash, the remaining half being held in trust at Ottawa to their credit.

Honor For the Duke.
Now the Metlakatlas, having in mind the coming royal visit of the Governor General, have, through their guide, philosopher and friend, Indian Agent C. C. Perry, arranged for and purchased a complete new set of musical instruments, 31 pieces in number, from the leading firm of musical instrument makers in Toronto, Messrs. Whaley Royce & Co. These instruments, which are silver plated and chased, are said by the firm to be the finest ever sent out to any band in Canada—up to the present time.

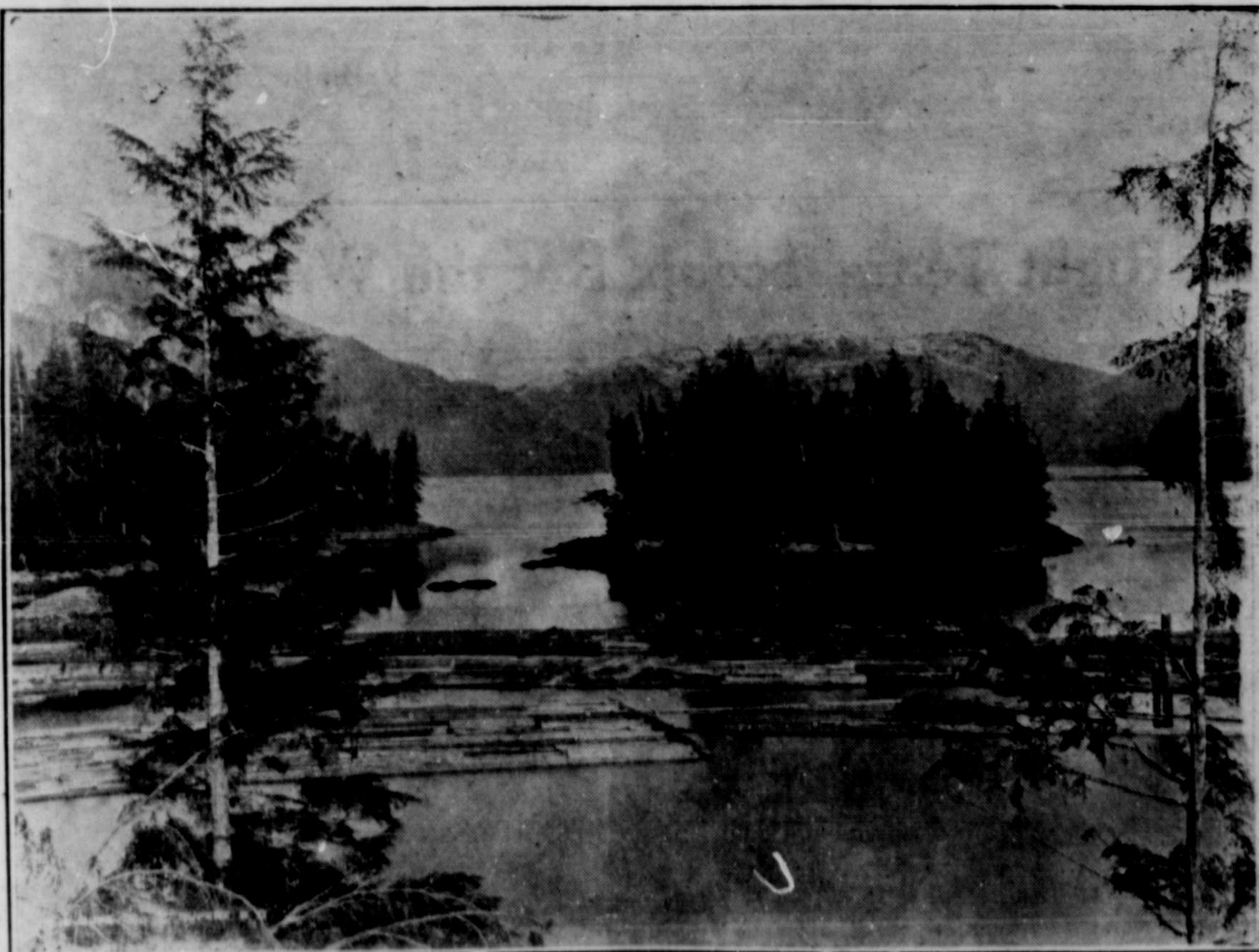
\$1,600 Worth of Instruments
The cost, \$1,600, cash laid down here, is no insignificant sum and speaks volumes for Metlakatla's enterprise and loyalty in doing everything in their power to bring distinction and success both to themselves and Northern British Columbia generally upon the coming visit of the royal party.

If they do not win out in the band competitions that are going to take place it will not be

for the lack of enterprise and ambition. Mr. C. C. Perry, who was in the city yesterday to receive the sacred consignment, arranged with Mr. F. N. Davis to convey them over to Metlakatla yesterday afternoon.

Manding Them Over.
Today a solemn ceremony will take place before the Indian agent, that is the receipt of the old instruments into his hands and the presentation of the new ones. The latter will be used for the first time in public upon the reception to be accorded the Governor General. The old instruments will be sold for cash to the highest bidder, the proceeds to be devoted to municipal improvements in Metlakatla. The whole carrying out of the affair is most interesting, and might well make some of the white people sit up and take notice.

MISSING MAYOR IS DISCOVERED

Edmonton, Aug. 15.—Light was thrown on the disappearance of Alexander Knox, late mayor of Wetaskiwin, Alberta, today, when it was learned by local solicitors, who have handled the affairs of creditors of Mr. Knox, who live in the Old Country, that the former mayor left from Quebec yesterday for Aberdeen, Scotland, to face the alleged charges against him.
Mayor Knox is accused of having been short a large sum in accounts when he left the Old Country. He resigned his position suddenly on hearing that his whereabouts were known in Scotland, and left without saying a word to anyone, preferring to go back on his own accord and face his accusers, rather than be taken back in custody.

METLAKATLA'S LOYALTY.

No higher compliment could be paid the British flag than the homage done it, and the royal house of Britain by the original inhabitants of the countries which are now British Dominions. In the action of the Metlakatla Indians with the plan to excel themselves in the effort to do particular honor to the Duke of Connaught is seen a typical example of this. There is wisdom, too, in the method chosen by the Indians to celebrate the coming of the Duke, for it is certain that they will derive satisfaction from their outlay long after the Governor General has gone from the district while still whenever they hear or look upon their handsome instruments they will remember the occasion of their purchase.

CANADA AND PANAMA.

While other countries expecting to derive benefit from the opening of the Panama Canal are except for terms of treaties, in no position to retaliate in case of actual unfairness by the United States in administering the Canal, Canada is in a different position. Canada has power to show in manner which America cannot but keenly appreciate, any dissatisfaction the Dominion may feel with the United States actions regarding the Panama Canal. Canada is also in the position today of having played a nobler part over canal administration than the States proposes to do by the recent Senate decision. One million dollars and more have been paid by Canada for the construction of canals opening access from the great lakes to the Atlantic. More American vessels than Canadian use the Welland Canal, and Canada allows them toll-free passage. If the freedom of ocean passage is thus allowed on fresh water and inland waterways by Canada to the United States, would it not seem more fitting still that a canal from ocean to

ocean should be administered with absolute equality to all nations needing its advantages?

STILL THE SOREHEAD SPOILS SPORT.

Judging from the opinions expressed by champions of the opposing football factions in Prince Rupert today, there exists still the small sore-head feeling on both sides which is bidding fair to destroy the proper interest that the community might otherwise take in the young men who are rivals in athletic sport of this branch. Every effort made to develop good going athletics in present day Prince Rupert is a step towards the day when Prince Rupert will have a public recreation park renowned along the Pacific Coast, and a company of high-spirited athletes renowned throughout Canada, and perhaps also the world, a credit to their city. But while the time is wasted by petty and unpleasant sounding bickerings between the budding teams of athletes, between individual runners, and other followers of sport the proper object of athletic enterprise in Prince Rupert is sadly missed.

REALTY MEN ARE ALL ROBY.

There is something distinctly promising for Prince Rupert's speedy prosperity in the confidence evinced in the city at present by the real estate men. One and all they are quietly contented with the progress of the city from their point of view. Such wide outside interest is attracted towards Prince Rupert, that hardly an enquiry's dropping in to one or day passes without some new other of the realty men promising a profitable deal, or on which a profitable deal is not completed. The outlook of the realty men always tending towards the day of the greater Prince Rupert is a more inspiring one than that of the man compelled to focus his mind on the narrower aspects of the city's life today.

Rev. F. W. Kerr Replies to Capt. Tutte

To the Daily News:

I know that there must be so many differences of conviction upon the deep mystery of human destiny not only among ministers but among all classes of men that I am not surprised that one of my fellow ministers, Capt. Tutte, has uttered a protest against my position.

In the Scripture texts there has been difficulty with the words Hades and Gehenna, both translated Hell—yet Hades implies only the shadowy abode of good and bad alike without any implication of punishment. Gehenna, on the other hand, was the place of burning.

It might be well to deal with one direct statement of Jesus—Matthew 25:46: "These shall go away into everlasting punishment." The word translated everlasting is aionios. An aion is a completed period, almost always implying the period for the fulfillment of a task or purpose. At the time of Jesus, it was also used to mean "everlasting," but in its original sense the one thing it did not mean was an indefinite extension of empty time. The implication is qualitative rather than quantitative, whether we say "everlasting punishment" or "everlasting life." However, I think most scholars would agree that from the word aionios a dogmatic conclusion could not be drawn that Jesus meant interminable.

But the real significance of this sentence can not be understood unless we consider very carefully the word used for punishment. Here again the Greek has two clearly defined words, "Kolasis" and "timoria" where we use the one translation "punishment." Timoria means ven-

geance and is always used for punishment that is retributive; Kolasis means correction and whenever used means punishment that is remedial. The word used by Jesus in this verse is Kolasis. If we are true to his meaning, therefore, we ought to believe that the wicked go into age-long correction.

I know that these minutiae of exegesis are too often used by preachers to find material to confuse their people and buttress up their own theories. But in this case it is necessary for the very soul of our religion to search and see if Jesus did not mean something more consistent with man's idea of just and wise treatment. After all, we are men and have the rights of men, and we would not call any judgment upon us righteous unless we are tried and convicted by our own standards of right and wrong. If God had a code of His own different from our moral code by which He tried us, it would be sheerest injustice. Our code says that to pursue a man with purposeless retribution is a lowering of our own proper nature; that it is not Godlike but ignorant cruelty. I would prefer a doctrine even to violate isolated texts than to violate the entire conception of God's wisdom and love as taught by our Master.

Not that I think wise, chastening punishment to be inconsistent with love. Browning says "All's law, yet all's love." And the laws of love are not fleecelined; they are iron and inexorable but never spasmodic nor arbitrary.

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REFUSE TO GRANT STAY OF EXECUTION FOR MAYOR NEWTON

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 15.—Mr. Justice Murphy in the supreme court chamber yesterday refused the application of Mr. R. D. Walker for Mayor Newton of Prince Rupert, asking stay of execution in the Manson libel judgment. The application by J. H.
